The Inaugural Humiliation, Andrew Johnson, the Vice President, elect, presented himself drunk at the grea nauguration ceremony, in the presence of the assembled executive and judicial departments of the Government, the repre-

ntatives of the people, the Senate ov which he is to preside, a large concourse of sitizens from all parts of the country, and of the foreign diplomatists and visitors. Before that imposing concourse ne bellowed for half an hour the ldiotic babble of a mind besetted by a fortnight's debauch. He boasted himself as a specimen of the working of American institutions, which brought brought such a man as he to the secont place in the Government. He dragged its proudest ceremony into the slough of hi-degradation, and turned it to chame and humiliation.

degradation, and turned it to chaine and humiliation.

This cannot be covered up as a private infirmity. It was exhibited before the world. We have to discuss it as a public calamity, and as a national insult and diagrace which demands relief. Mr. Johnson should at once resign the place he has so dishonored, and in which he can never have the respect of any American citizen, and should relire to private life, where his wallowing will befoul no one but himself. The nation cannot suffer the dishonor that a man who was inaugurated drunk, who drivelled over the Holy Book as he took the oath of office, and shamed the nation in the cycs of the world, should sit to preside over the Senate and represent the second executive office. And it cannot afford to keep open the risk of such an alternative in case of the death or disability of the President.

Georgetown district is the richest rice growing, section of the Union, and has doubtless been of great importance to the rebels during the war. The Situation Abroad, The news from France received by the Goba is altogether of a less oracular, and of a decidedly more satisfactory character than we have received for many months. The Emperor's Government has given assumate to our representative, that no cession has been made to France of Mexican territory, and that the transaction in the matter of the Northern provinces resolves itself simply into a lien on the product of certain mines. His explanation, accompanied asit was by a denial of any intention to recognize the "Confederacy," is said to have caused intense depression in all the rebel circles of Paris. Although there may be some reasons for not accepting in its literal series experts. he some reasons for not accepting in its literal sense every sort of assurance, even if it comes officially, from this quarter, still there could be no greater error than to foster suspicions against the bina fides of a foreign Power, which has, thus far given us no cause for an open quarrel, and even less cause for protest and remonstrance, thun certain others. It is better to believe that the Emperor's Government says what it means, and to avoid the foolish business of discounting difficulties which, under sagacious management, need have no existence.

The grand effort to connect the Old and New Worlds by tolegraph, by way of Rehring Straits, is now fairly commenced. On Tuesday the steamer Shubrick silled from San Francisco for Sitka or Now Archangel, in Russian America, hearing the ploneer exploring company for the line. She will isnd a prrty at Victoria, whose business is to work up through the Fraser River region unit shey connect with the Russian American branch. Thence they proved through the unexplored regions between the regular Bocky Mountains and the Soast Range to the Youcan River, and so on to the neighborhood of Cape Prince of Wales. These cold and inhospitable regions are quite anknown, save from the dublour reports of the aborigines, and the reports of the Bightning explorers' toils will have all the charm of history from a New Warld. The line now running from San Francisco through Oregon will soon be completed to New Westminster, and by this connection we shall get frequent reports of the progress of the great work.

The glimpses of Richmond, which are now and then given us by the press of that city, reveal neither a hopeful nor a harmonious spectacle. 
