of the Connellaville Road for its own pro-It matters not to the public who builds the road, so that we get the road built. Let Pittsburgh be true to her own interests. Let her morehants, capitalists, and busi-

The meeting to which our correspondent refers was called for the sole purpose of giving expression to the public feeling in favor of the repeal of the wicked legisla tion of last winter, relative to this road, and in confining its action to this purpose it simply carried out the object for which it was convened. It was not, to be sure, precluded thereby from taking action on a collateral questien; but it might have weakened its voice with the legislature i it had, while demanding the repeal of a certain act, taken steps showing that it did not care whether that act was repealed or not. We think, therefore, that the meet ing acted wisely in simply embodying the unanimous feeling of this community

favor of reversing the action of the last legislature in repealing the act incorpora ting the Connellsville Railroad Company. That having been done, and well done there is now no good reason why the prop dion of Messry, Cass and HARBUAGH should not be separately considered on its merit-It is a simple, plain, business-like proposition; and it is for the husiness men of Phtsburgh to give it a fair, candid and ear-

The Postal Laws. The Postal LawaThe new act relating to the postal lawa, provides that all domestic letters, except ieters lawhilly franked, and duly cortified etters of soldiers and marines. In the service of the United State, which are deposited for mailing in any post office of the United States, on which postage is unputd, shall be sent by postmasters to the Deal Letter Office in Washington, and all letters deposited for mailing, paid only in part, forwarded to the destination, charged with the unpaid rate to be collected on delivery.

The system of free delivery is to be established in every place containing a populalished in every place containing a popula-tion of 50,000 within the delivery of the of-fice thereof, and at such other places as the Post-Master General in his judgment shall rost-Master General in ms judgment shad direct; precided, that the pre-payment post-age on drop letters in all places where free delivery is not established; shall be one cont only. Persons depositing obscene books, pamphlets, &c., in the mails are to be pun-ished by fine and imprisonment.
