The business interest of Pittsburgh imperatively require the early completion of the Connellaville road.

THE DECKINE IN GOLD. Gold continues to fall steadily, as if the bottom had been knocked out of it. Whether it is to the policy of the new Scoretary of the Treasury, to the tide of gold setting in anew from California, to the victories our arms, to the evidently approaching col bined, that this fall is owing, it is difficult to say ; but the fact of the decline is indisputable. The buils appear to liave lost contro of it e market, and now that steady decline is in vita le the fact will grow clearer day by day that much of the advance in Gold beyond 200 was factitious, and did not represent its real value. The control of the market unfortunately passed into the hands of a few unscrupulous men, some of them oper-ating for political purposes, and all for something more than gain. As soon as the political contest of last year was decided, gold began to decline, It has fluctuated a great deal since, violent offorts having been made to keep it up; but the steady tenden-cy has been downward; and the greater that tendency grows the less will grow the influence over the market of those who have so long been its arbiters. We hope we have

soon the last of the days of high premium en gold. This decline may be the ruln of a horde of speculators, over whose fall no one will irn, but it will not be felt seriously by business men of the country. At least we think not, and we do not therefore partake of the fears of some who have looked brward with terror to what is now daily taking place. Gold has now declined 120 per cent. from its, highest point, and that within less than a year; yet business goes on as usual. It cannot decline much further, at present, nor until the resumption of specie payments becomes probable; but it is not likely to culvance, and the business of the country will so soon adapt itself to the change that has already taken place that there will scarcely be any trace of its having occurred.

Flax Manufactures. In the early history of this country flax was an important item which entered into its manufactures. Our good grandmothers considered a knowledge of spinning and weaving an indispensable accomplishment and every girl was inducted into the prac chold arts. In those days cotton was scarcely known, and our clo were linens and woolens, both the product of hand-work. The raw fabrics were card-ed and prepared for manufacture by hand, ed and prepared for manufacture by hand, for a long period, but carding machines were finally introduced, which converted wool into "rolls" which were spun by hand, and subsequently woven by the same means. But no machine was invented to prepare the flax, and its manufacture was continued by hand till its uss was superceded by cotion.

was continued by hand till its use was su-perceded by cotton.

In the early manufacture of this article, the weaving was done by hand, the yarr being spun by machinery and then distri-buted throughout the country to be woven After this, the manufacture of flax almos Autor this, the manufacture of flax almost entirely ceased, and when in the progress of cotton manufactures the power-oom was adopted, the question was settled, and manufactures of flax were only to be remembered. The flabrics, however, survived, and remained a fitting tribute to the industry and remained a fitting tribute to the industry and manufacture. ustry and manual skill of the and daughters of the generation that he passed. Various degrees of success have attended these efforts, and there is a good prospect that the culture and manufacture prospect that the culture and manufacture of flax will, ere long, become an important element in our industry. We were no element in our industry. We were not aware that so great progress had been made, and such a variety of articles had been manufactured, till we saw, a day or two since, at the office of Governor Smith, sovernikinds of goods made from flux fibor, such as carpeta, heavy crash and seamle s bags, the other articles being introduced to show the applicability and value of the fibor, large quantities of it, till recently, being thrown away after the seed had been secured.

On inquiry, we learned that Goy, Smith as early as September, 1862, determined to enter upon the business. He erected works at Delaware, Obio, which have been in operation for more than a year. There is a brick mill, one hundred and twenty-cight by forty feet, with machinery of the most improved kinds for the breaking and the scutching of the straw, with plekera &c., the power being furnishers by a Corlissistam engine. Connected with the mill is a barn, the largest in the State, deling two hundred and fifty feet wide, for receiving and storing the straw. After being reduced and prepared, the product is brought to Rhode Island, and manufactured Into the criticles before waitinged.
