THE DIFFICULTIES OF THE NEW

Never did we see such a tanglo as that i which the late act of Congress has thrown the work of filling the quotas of sub-districts. Things were working well under the old system, and they worked well under the calls of 1864; but some restless spirits in Congress, who are never content to 'let well enough: alone,": must: needs tinker with the law, and change the whole pro gramme at the most inopportune momen resociable, when the work of filling que tas under the free system was about half done, and was progressing satisfactorily.

After allowing about half the sub-districts to fill their quotas with men of their own or other districts or sub-districts, just a they pleased or found most advantageou and convenient, and when other sub-districts had made arrangements to do the same thing, suddenly they are put under restrictions, and obliged to confide them clves to their own narrow limits, where, in, many cases, it is, found impossible to obtain recruits. In some cases all the men of a sub-district who could enlist had already done so, and given their credits to other districts before their own had made ready to pay local bountles; and then when they were ready, they were suddenly d prived of the privilege which others has enjoyed, and by which they themselve had lost their own available men. If this be not unjust and unequal treatment we are at a loss to know what may be

The whole thing is wrong from beginning to end. What we need to put this thing as near right as it can be made under this new law is this: Let an order be issued to the effect that the enrollment lists shall be the evidence of a man's residence. If his name is not found there, let it be understood—in a military sense—that he has no residence, and is free to callist to the credit of any sub-district or club that will employ him. Such an order, while it would work he injustice to anybody, would prework to injustice to anybody, would prevent a vast amount of injustice, and render available thousands of men who are now practically debarred from entering the service. This would apply to veterans of two years and upwards, to young men between the ages of 18 and 20, to affens, and, for anght we can see, to men who paid commutation in 1863. Let all these be credited to the sub-districts which pay them, whether enlisted as volunteers, club-volunteers, or in-

dividual substitutes. As things now stand, this provision for clubs is but a mockery and a delusion, and of no practical benefit—calculated to distract and discourage the people, rather than ruled that a man not enrolled has de realdence, in the military sense of that word, so that the members of clubs might go out of the parrow limits of their sub-districts to getatheir men, and then let them be credited to their own proper sub-district, it might be made to work admirably.

PROGRESS OF THE WAR. Enerman's great march continues suimpeded. The relelarmy, defeated at Kingston, was to make a stand at Goldsboro but has evidently thought better of it, and retreated to Raleigh. The general supposition has been that the united armies of BRAGG, HARDEE and JOHNSTON Would nake a stand there, if anywhere; but reports reach us that even Raleigh has been abandoned, and that Johnston will not nake a stand until he finds LEE within sup-

porting distance, No one knows, of course, what Sugn MAN'S Original plan was: but, whatever it was, lie has adhered to it, and it is now plain that his march from Columbia was directed to Goldsboro and not to Raleigh. That point was fixed upon for the junction of his forces with those of Schorized, and be marched straightto it, confidently counting upon Schorizan's success as a matter of course. He has not been disappointed. That SHERMAN calculated upon the possibility of a fight at Raleigh, and

It is but one hundred and fifty miles from Goldsboro to Peters burg; and this can be traversed in less than two weeks. We venture to guess, therefore, that SHERMAN will push direct for Peters Luig, surround Richmond on the western side, and hem LEE in completely, if he does not succeed in making his escape mean ime.
