WE ask attention to the address in today's paper, of the American Freedmen's Aid Union. This society is composed of henest, upright, trusty men, and the views ent meet our cordial approval. They state the case very clearly and concisely, and the importance of the measures they propose cannot be overestimated. The approaching end of the war opens up new uestions which must be met, and our chief concern is to meet them in the proper spirit, and dispose of them as truth, freedom, justice and humanity dictate. Mere expedients will be plenty, conjured up to avoid settling these questions on their merits; but the only true expedient is to

do what we know to be right.

As we anticipated, the several societies to aid the Freedmen, which have sprung up all over the country-the true and spoancous out-growth of a generous Christian impulse to meet a great necessity—are about to be united in one grand National Unionin institution which can be properly recognised by the Government, and work in coeperation with it in raising up these mil-lions of our people who have been suddenly lifted from the lowest bondage to entire freedom, yet left by the tremendous revo lution which broke their bonds, poor, ignorant, helpless, homeless, disorganized, and in need of all things except faith, and hope, and the will to do what they can.

This is not a work of charity, in the low, cold sense of that word; for we owe these people reparation for past wrongs, and still more for their faithfulness and kindness to us during this fearful conflict. At the risk of life they have fed, secreted, guided and comforted our suffering prisoners. God seems to have set them to these offices of mercy as he sent the ravens to feed the patriat prophet when he, a friendless fugitive, them gratitude, moreover, for helping us to fight our battles; and we are their debtors for their uniform good conduct in all things during the war-that their hands are unstained with a single act of barbarity or vengeance towards their enemies and ours But, above all things else, we are bound to do all we can do for them for the sake of HIM after whose love they so ardently yearn, and in whom they believe with the simplicity of little children, and with a sablimity of trust such as the world has never before witnessed.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS The utter de moralization of the democratic party is plainly shown in the recent municipal elections in the western States. At the elections on the 3d inst., the Republicans carried two of the old Democratic atrongholds. in the west-namely: Detroit and Milwau. kee. In the former the Republicans had 150 majority, and in the latter a Republican Mayor was elected for the first time. Time out of mind these cities have been democratic-overwhelmingly so. Last fall-Milwaukee gave over 5,000 majority for McClellan and Detroit about 1,000. When the party cannot hold such strong entrenchments as those of Detroit and Milwaukee its rase is as hopeless as the Confederacy since the fall of Richmond.

Let the old regulations be maintained. Let the order that prisoners looking out of the window be shot, still continue in force. It will do no harm to have this system made to continue for a while at least. Those prisoners who complain of Fort Delaware, Polat Lookout, Elmira, Johnson's Island, and the other prisons, may be allewed, from time to time, to taste a little of Litby life by way of contrast. Then let us maintain the two establishments as military prisons so long as the rebellion lasta, and when it is effectually subdued, let them be razed and burned, so that not a vestige shall remain of such dens of Infamous torture.—
