THE HOVEMENT IN VIRGINIA. While nothing is better calculated to attest how thoroughly the rebellion is squelched than the call of the old Rebel Legislature to assemble in Richmond, in order to get the "Old Dominion" back into the Union yet there is an aucacity about the affair which could be found no where clse upon earth than in Virginia. Mr. Lincoln, it appears, gave his consent

that this movement should be made, and promised a safe conduct to those who should attend. But what will this body of men do when it does get together? It cannot be a Legislature, for the members were elected under Confederate auspices, and to recognize it, as a Legislature, would be a virtual recognition of the Confederacy after it is defunct, a thing which was scrupulously avoided while it had full I fe and vigor. Will it be an authoritative Convention, representing the people of Virginia, and compotent to treat with the National Government in their name? That cannot be; and for the same reason that it cannot be recognized as a Legislative body. If it cannot be recognized cither as a Convention or as a Legislature by the National Government, can it enact any laws for that State which would have any binding force before a court of dice? To say so would be to concede to that State the very thing it has been contending for-independence. It follows, then, from logic is sound, that this assem'lage will be nothing more than a meeting of citizens to consult together upon the affairs of the State in this extraordinary exigency.
