In response to the call for a meeting of the cal izens of Allegheny county, (published in the city papers a day or two since) "for the purpose of considering the present state of the country-to express their opinions upon the policy and measures of President Johnson's administration in the suppression of the rebellion and the restoration of local authority in the lately revolted lates, and to further the arrest and punishmen of traitors," about two hundred citizens assem hed at the control of George R. White, Esq., the meting was called to order by the appointment of Hon. T. J. Bigham as Chairman. Mr. Bigham stated that the object of the meeting, as he understood it, was to hold up the hands of the Mational Administration, and sustain and excurace the President in his efforts to crush out Mational Administration, and spatiate and encourage the President in his efforts to creak out the rebellion and punish traitors.

On motion of Wm. A. Herron, Esci, the following Ylee President were chosen; Hou. Wm. F. Johnston, Col. James M. Cooper, Thomas M. Marshall, Esq., Geo. R. White, Esq., Wm. Phillips, Esq., and Dr. Geo. L. McCook.

The reporters of the press were designated as Secretarics.

Gov. Johnster regretted the alim attendance, and presumed that there must be some good reason why the call for the meeting had not been properly responded to. He had noticed a growing disposition, even among the more influential men in the community, to deal releating with those who inaugurated the rebellion and Suential men in the community, to deal reviently with those who inaugurated the rebellien and deluged the hand with blood. He was wholly opposed to any such policy, and advocated, in strong items, full and adequate punishment for every traitor. He came to the meeting expecting to see a large representation from all parts of the county, but he had been sailly disappointed. He thought that the press had been raticularly derelict is the matter. They should either have noticed the meeting with approbation or boldly condemned it. Their silence pointed. Their sileace in regard to it was an act of cowardice, and he did not care who heard him say so. The speaker then went on to say that, owing to the very limited number in attendance, it would be useless as well as untrue to publish to the world that their action, whatever it might be, would represent the sentiments of the people of Allogheny county. They were not here, and of course the meeting could not represent the sentiments of the people of the county. He had prepared a series of resolutions, which he latended to offer: had the meeting been such as was anticipated, but he would not offer them, and moyed that the meeting adjourns size die. There were some present who favored an adjourned meeting, but he was apposed to this proposition, for the reason that adjourned meetings were reidom, if ever, better attended than those which created them. He therefore moved that the county, and the reason why the attendance was not larger was, because the people of the county were all of one mind. All felt satisfied that President Johnson was "the right man in the right place," and that he would discharge his duties faithfully, fearlessly and firmly. He had drawn up three bright resistations, for which he was responsible, as they had come through no committee, and which he would submit for the consideration of the meeting. That the past life of the distinguished patriot who has been suddenly called to the execution of the highest earthy trust, is the surest guarantee that the duties and collegations of the office will be faithfully, honestly and firmly discharged. Mr. Bigham remarked that he had the honor to be one of the Committee appointed at Harrisburg, to convey to the President the assurances of support from the people of Pennsylvania, and had beard him copress, in person, sentiments precisely elimist to those expressed in the second resolution offered by Mr. Marshall.

Colonel Cooper called upon Governor Johnston to submit the resolutions prepared by him, so that both sets might be placed before the meeting.
