DISLOYALTY NOT CONQUERED.

The news from the South, particularly Virginia, is well calculated to fill reflecting minds with alarm. Although the rebellion as an organized power is crushed, it is pe fectly plain that the spirit of rebellion is as rampant, insolent and defiant as ever Planters still insist upon their right to ad minister the old discipline of the plantations and the freedmen have no more protection under the laws than they had while they were slaves; and what little freedom they have gained by emancipation is nullified by iel and oppressive social regulations They are denied the poor privilege of being parties to the bargain as to the compensa tion they shall get for their labor. A feel ing of intense bitterness must naturally ring out of such a relation between the laboring class and their employers. The negroes know they are free; but the whites persist in treating them as slaves. The high hopes which the emancipation procla and the crushing of the power of the slave holders by the Union armies, excited in their minds, are followed by bitter disag pointment. The armies which they halled as deliverers, and which thousands of them gladly joined, have been withdrawn, and they left to the mercy of their former opressors; are treated as formerly, but without the protection which their value as

erty once secured to them. But, conquered as they are, these Southrons regard their conquerors with very little more respect than they do the negroes They still glory in their rebellion. What kind of lovalty prevails in a county where a candidate for Sheriff urges his claim for the suffrages of the people on the ground that he served four years in the army of the Confederacy? Are those the kind of men to constitute a State? Have we any war. rant as rational men to hope for peace with such elements mixed up with our political system? That fellow knew his men, or he would not have urged a plea, which really made him a good candidate for the halter, as a reason why he should be elected to

in the government to which they owe obedthose people adhere to slavery in any form -so long they are in active rebellion. Solemnly, and before heaven and earth, our if these freed people are to be left entirely to the mercy of the men out of whose hands they were delivered by the strong hand of the government, better that they had been left as they were. Emancipation is a cruel mockery, a positive wrong, if the southern people shall be allowed to rivet the same fetters moon a class which the government struck from the limbs of individuals. What is it but a fresh act of rebellion, a contempt of its authority, a defiant nullification of its

Wendell Phillips on Reconstruction. To the Editors of the Boston Daily Advertiser:—
(ne principle of reconstruction has been one principle of reconstruction has been unanimously assented to on both sides of Mason and Dixon's line, namely, that the people of no heretofore slave State shall be invested with the rights of membership and representation in the government of the United States without the recognition in its constitution of the abolition of slavery. This is not a voluntary act on the part of all the rebel States at least, if it is of any one. In is a not a voluntry act on the part of any one. It is a condition prescribed and enforced upon them. Whether it is put upon the ground assumed by Mr. Dana in his address at the recent meeting in Fancuil Hall, that the rebellion has been a war sui generic resulting in conquest and not a mere insurrection and its suppression,—or put upon the the ground that by the illegality and violence of the acts of those States from that of secession downwards, each of them has reduced itself to a condition of absolute anarchy, without any legal recognizable political organism, until a resuscitation by act of Congress—is immaterial. In one of these ways the heretofore rebels are now in a state of political catalepsy. This is acknowledged by the inhabitants themselves, for they apply for a reconstruction which admits the lact—an unquestionable fact—of previous destruction. And the United States say to them, one absolute condition to the proposition of slavery

previous destruction. And the United States say to them, one absolute condition is the prior act of the abolition of slavery and repeal of all the laws establishing, regulating or recognizing such a thing as a live human chattel.

This then is a ciaim on one side and admission on the other, of a right on the part of the United States to prescribe the terms of reconstruction. If there is not such a right under the present circumstances, then it will follow that the inhabitants of any State, under the implicitly reserved suppreme law of State rights, may declare war against the U. States, or join another nation in a war against the United States, and falling of success, may turn about, chose members of the Senate and House of Representatives, and come and demand as of right an admission into Congress; a pretention to extravagant to be asserted by the sturdlest State rights and snarchy rights advocate, outside of Virginia and South Carolina.

I conclude than that the United States have a right under the present circumstances, to prescribe the conditions of reconstruction. The case is not expressly provided for by the Constitution, for the reason perhaps, assigned for the omission in some ancient code to specify the panishment of parricide, that so attrocious a crime would never be committed. But the case is not beyond the limits of the universal law of reason, justice and prudence, and we may add fraternity, which forbid vindictiveness, but enjoin "security for the future."


