BAILBOAD TO OIL CITY. The Allegheny Valley Railroad will be extended to the mouth of Mahoning early this fall. The work is being pushed with great energy, under the supervision of WM. PRILLIPS, Esq., the President of that company, than whom we know of no man more getic or capable of pushing through whatever he takes in hand. The distance from Kittanning to Mahoning is only ten miles. The mouth of Mahoning is a very imports a point in itself, as at that place a large portion of the trade of Clarion, Jefferson, Elk; and other counties lying east of the Allegheny, concentrates. The most intelligent men connected with that road have always contended that the extension of the road from Kittanning to Mahoning would double its business and revenues.

But this is but the first step towards a farmore important extension—we mean the Mahoning and Oil City Railroad, (which is practically but a continuation of the Allegheny Valley Road) to Oil City, following the valley of the river all the way. The distance from Mahoning to Oil City is sixty five miles. The survey and location will be completed early in August, when it will remain, dear sir, yours, very truly, Whatever he takes in hand. The distance be completed early in August, when it will be immediately let out in small contracts to men who will push the work vigorously It is estimated that it can be made at an ex pense of from eight hundred thousand to one million dollars. The means will be mainly furnished by some enterprising, citizens of Pittsburgh, who have the sagacity o see that it is a first rate operation; for the oil business alone, to say nothing of the yery large miscellaneous trade and travel it

will have, will make it one of the best paying roads in the country. the original programme. DESTITUTION IN THE SOUTH. The accounts of want and suffering among people of the South should be taken with considerable allowance for exageration. That in some parts such destitution exists is doubtless true, such as along the line of Sherman's march and where the country has been inundated by the breaking of the levees of the Mississippi. But that the state of the Southern people gencrally is one approaching actual starvation we think an erroneous inference draws from narrow and inadequate observation of details. Not a fourth part of the counties of the Gulf States have suffered to any appreciable extent by the direct acts of our soldiers, and certainly as regards the effects of the war in general, they are better off now than while it lasted. The tremendous loads laid on them by the confederate government—the impressment of supplies, the tax in kind and other levies—have been removed, and now whatever they raise, ex

cept here and there losses by individual underers, is for their own support. Nor has nature been unfavorable to their efforts. This year all kinds of products are vielding abundantly, wherever planted, in all sections of the South. From June when the wheat crop is harvested, until November, there is an incessant ingath ering of produce of various kinds, some of which, as the sweet potatoes and pea crops, of minor importance at the North, go far toward furnishing sustenance to the

The abelition of slavery, of course, to some degree interfered with the supply of that kind of labor, which formerly was re-Hed on by the South as a sure thing. From time to time accounts have been published of an alarming epidemic which prevails in Western Siberia, and appears to e making its way westward, Sometimes it is called the Russian Plague, but other nedical men speak of it as a variety of typhus or typhoid fever. Rumor, however has already declared it to be identical with the great plague which raced so fearfully in London and elsewhere just two hundred years ago, and also with the Black Death, of the fourteenth century. Although we do not believe in the identity of this epidemic and the Black Death, a short account of the Erening Post will not be uninteresting

THE "BLACK DEATH," In 1202 China was severely afflicted by fandne. Floods and carthquakes preceded it, destroying about a half a million of persons. The next year the plague followed, and more than five millions perished. Tartary was next visited, the pestilence taking the route of the caravans into Russia. It Oil City.

The next year universal scarcity reged throughout Italy, and the famine-plague had already begun its devastations when it was overpowered and lost sight of

Language fails to describe the horrible scenes that attended its rapid progress. The destruction of human life was without a parallel. Whole families everywhere pera parallel. Whole families everywhere per-lahed together, or escaped in part by the dissolving of the best feelings and affections of our nature. They who were yet unstrick-en shunned and fled away from their nearest relatives. Fathers, even mothers, aban-doned their offspring on the appearance of the deadly swelling at the throat or armpit; children abandoned the death-bed of their parents; husband and wife, brother and estet, forsook each other in the hour of agony.

Between March and July following, ac cording to authentic reckonings, upward of a tundred thousand souls periabed in the city of Florence; whereas, before that calamity, it was not supposed to have contained so many inhabitants.

We are told that eighty thousand died at Sicnna, eixty thousand at Naples, one hundred thousand at Venice, forty thousand at Genoa, seven in ten at Pisa, and at Trapani in Sicily, not a human being survived.

I have heard tell how good a crust of bread tasted. Children will eat the little, hard, green peaches with the relish ours eat ripe ones, and it is common for young men when digging Irish potatoes, as they stop to rost, to pare and eat them as one does apples. The children of all classes prefer milk when soured, and it is common to see little ones eat it so thick that they crowd it into their mouths with their flugers. They will dat raw sweet potatoes, and think nothing better. The next step is to eat grass—the final one to eat clay.
