CITY AND SUBURBAN.

A Home for Disabled Soldiers in Western Pennsylvania—An Important Arrangement Completed.

The great Sanitary Fair, held in this city in 1864, was one of the most important events connected with the war, as tending to exhibit the liberality and patriotism of the citizens of Western Pennsylvania. One of the most important measures adopted by the Executive Committee, to whom was entrusted the management of the Fair, was the passage of a resolution setting apart twenty-five per cent. of the fund for the purpose of establishing a Home for Disabled and Indigent Soldiers. Under this resolution, \$80,000 were set apart for the purpose specified, but, as the war was still in progress, no definite action was taken in the premises. With the close of the war, however, the committees found themselves in possession of funds amounting to about \$100,000, which were not needed for Sanitary purposes. Our troops began to return in large numbers, and among them many who had been permanently disabled in the service. The project for the erection of a Soldier's Home was at once re-visited, and for a time it received the most earnest and careful consideration of the Executive Committee, together with other warm friends of the measure. The committee finally agreed to add the above named sum (\$100,000) to the fund already appropriated for the establish-
