IGNORANCE AND DISLOYALTY. The only argument which the opponents of universal suffrage in the late rebel States put forth that is worthy of any reply at all is that the colored people are not sufficiently intelligent to become safe voters at once. We partly admit this; and would be very glad to give them a few years of pupilage to fit them for the great responsibility. But what is to be done in the mean time? Ignorance is bad, but disloyalty is worse. The negroes had intelligence enough to keep them loyal to the government, while the poor whites, almost as ignorant and ilterate as they, went madly and blindly innegroes fought for the Union, while very few indeed of the other class in the thoroughly elave States could be got into our service. The negroes without exception were ardently patriotic, while the whites with almost equal unanimity were intensely hostile. Now it is proposed to restore the latter to the full exercise of the franchise, and to exclude the former. To those who will live a century hence this, if done, will appear the strangest and most perverse and inexplicable chapter in the history of these

But it is still insisted that the great body of the blacks of the Bouth are too ignorant to become voters.
