The first of the conditions mentioned is that the white population of the South shall not be allowed the election of the representatives of the blacks, as would be the case if the former relation of the States to the central government were restored. Either the whites alone should be represented in Congress, or the right of suffrage should be made universal. Otherwise the voters of some of these States would have a power in the general government double that enjoyed by an equal number in the North. Of the alternatives mentioned, that of giving the negroes a right to vote is advocated, as being due to their well proven loyalty, as being theirs by nataral right, and as a measure of expediency,

in order to control the manifest disloyalty of the white population. The assertion that the negro vote would be cast only in accordance with the wishes of their old masters is next discussed, and shown to be utterly improbable. On the contrary, the repugnance of their masters to their former slaves has created a conflict, in which the ballot will be used by the latter as a means of defence.
