Allegnooy, a man named George Grinder, with his wife and children. His wife is a woman between thirty-five and forty

wife is a woman between thirty-five and forty years of age, and has heretofore borne a good character among her nelghbors, being noted for here coclability and kindness of her heart. Her husband is a laboling man, about forty-five years of age, but rather dedicate in force of character and latelligence. During the past few months, an unusual number of deaths has occurred in the house, but until recently it was not suspected that any foul means had been employed. The sudden sickness of a number of persons who had eaten at Mrs. Grinder's table at length swakened suspicion, and an investigation of the facts lead to the conclusion that she has been forcome months past in the habit of administering poison to her neighbors and the implaces of her house, from the effects of which it is alleged that several hare died. Among those who have died in her house within the last few months was a woman named Gallagher, a brother of her husband, Mr. Grinder, and so infant child, but we have not yet been able to ascertain the facts connected with the last death of their deaths. er. and an infant child, but we have not yet been able to ascertain the facts connected with their death.

Among their residing near Grinder's was a young gentleman named James S. Caruthers, who is employed in the dry goods house of Mr. James M. Carr, on Federal street, Alleghany. Mr. Caruthers formenty resided at New Castle, where he had coverted the

Mr. Caruthers formerly resided at New Castle, where he had murried Miss Mary Caroline Philips, with whom he removed to this city and occupied a house in the locality stated. On Threeday night, the 37th of June last, Mrs. Caruthers ato supper at the house of Mrs. Grinder, soon after which she took suddenly ill. She had no suspicion at the time that she had been poisoned, as she was on most friendly terms with Mrs. Grinder. She paradially recovered after been poisoned, as saw was on most intendit terms with Mrs. Grinder. She gradually recovered, after which her husband took her to the country, to visit some of her friends. On abla return he called to see Mrs. Grinder, and on her invitation at supper with her as he had no housekeeper at home. He was taken suddenly ill, and telegraphic his wife for return, which she did. He soon became convailscent, and resumed work as usual. On the 15th of July, Mrs. Grinder, and again was taken ill. Mrs. Grinder paid frequent visits to her, in her own house, carrying her little delicacies of various kinds, which she etc. She continued to grow worse and worre, and on the first of the present month ahe died, as Mrs. Grunthers was a young and perfectly healthy woman, her death caused some suprise, and was regraded as exceedingly strange, but still there were no asspicions of foul play. Her remains were taken to New Castle, where they were interred.
