This was a practical measure, much m substantial than words, and any honestly loyal Convention could and would have adopted it without reference or other circumlocation. What became of it? The Committee, it is certain, never reported it; and although Mr. PETRIEER made an earnest effort to get it again before the Convention, he failed, and his resolution was smothered. The Convention, profuse in its love for the soldier, found itself incaps ble of adopting and endorsing so plain and so unobjectionable a proposition

As the resolution was killed by being thus smothered to death, the Convention consenting thereto, we have a right to conclude that the sham democracy of this State are opposed to granting the soldiers of 1861 and 1863 a quarter section of land
