The vast flood of importations must be checked, or before two years there will be such a collapse as this country has

At home, these national bonds are a source of strength a solid foundation upon which our monetary system restsa species of capital, which imparts security, activity and enduring vigor to every interest-steady and advancing value to property-nnd which will keep the channels of circulation filled with a safe and ever-improving currency. Could these bonds be retained in the country and perform their proper function as a basis, a return to specle payments at an early day would be both safe and easy. But if they are to be shipped abroad in exchange for commodi-L'es which we can and ought to produce among ourselves, it it felly to hope for return to that desirable state of things. It

Why is gold at a premium of 145? What we have too much paper currency affoat ! Not at all; but it is because, under the present state of things, importers are able to pay that price for it to ship to Europe for goods. They keep up the price, not will-lingly, but because their exhausting business has that effect. Let us, however, cut down these imports so that our exports shall balance them; then the pressure upon the gold market will be relieved, and the difference between our metalic and paper cur. rency will rapidly become less and less, millit will be perfectly safe to return to the old state of things. The war, with its enormous debt, has imposed protection upon as a necessity. We not affird to employ manufacturers who do not live among us, feeding on the products of our fields and helping to pay our taxes. We must import manufacturers, not manufactures. We must pay our interest; but it is to the last degree important that we pay at home, so that it may flow back into our own channels of circulation. Interest paid at home cannot impoverish the country; but interest sent abroad will bankrupt it as sure as ever an effect followed an adequate cause TAXING GOVERNME NT BONDS.

It is plain the so-called Democracy are going in for taxing the national securities for state, county and municipal purposes, by state sutherity; Such action, while it would be a direct violation of the obligation of contracts, which is expressly unconstitutional, would be a direct nullification of the laws of Congress, which declare that they shall not be taxed. But were we to admit, for argument's sake, that it could be done, the effect would be disastrous, because i would stouce drive the bonds to Europe. where the tax collectors of states, counties &c., could never reach them. The result would be to cause an exhausting drain upon the coin of the country to pay interest while, as a revenue measure, it would be
