preserve what is right is of itself, very reble, and very respectable people en gaged in it. To be a conservative, in such a sense, involves no reproach; and every in that view of the case. But, conservatism, as it is known to-day

in this country, means simply resistance to change. It clings to what is, not because it is right, but simply because it is. It is hostile to all progress, to all reform, to all efforts at bettering or improving the condition of the buman race; and wherever any old evil clings with desperate tenacity to life, there the conservatives are gathered

long time the great bulwark of American alavery. It was the first to hurl stones at the old-time Abolitionists, and amused its leisure hours in throwing rotten eggs at the streets with halters around their necks. and occasionally gutting or fiving their dwellings; and through all the struggle of ime, which has at last ended in the abolition of slavery, conservatism has always stood by the side of the oppressor. Having failed to sustain slavery, it is now rallying to the congenial task of resisting chisement of the negro race. If it cannot keep the negroes enslaved, it can, at least, (or so it hopes,) keep them ignorant and legraded, and prevent them from attaining the comforts and rights of civilized life.

We well semember the first freedmen's chool that was established after the war broke out. Self-denying men and women went down to South Carolina and opened schools to which the negroes flocked with the utmost eagerness to learn; but the 'Conservatives," who just then had control of the army, instead of rejoicing at this evidence of progress and encouraging it, speered at it impeded the movement in every possible way, and taboord every man and woman engaged in it. The army has changed since then, and for the better; but conservatives have never ceased to throw dirt at the teachers, to interpose schools, and to exercise its utmost power towards keeping the negro ignorant and en-

alaved. The effort to establish schools among the freed negroes is one that might well be supposed to appeal successfully to the better feelings of every intelligent man; but Conservatism knocks the wind completely out of such a supposition. It is not so very long since it resisted the education of the whites; and now very many of those educated in spite of it, unite with it in refusing education to another race as fully entitled to its blessings as they. They will prat you homilies by the hour about the blessings of education, but ask them to aid in educating a down-trodden race and they will tell you that the privilege of learning belongs only to the "superior" race.

The great fear of the Conservatives is that the negroes will, if educated, be brought to an "conslity" with hem. Heaven help us ! If ever the black race should attain to enlightenment and the enjoyment of their political rights, we shall be much disappointed if they rest contented with being merely 'coust' to the Conservatives. If they could not rise above that point it would hardly be worth while to labor for their elevation.

If is announced as a settled fact that nowhere can a freedmen's school be maintained at the South away from the protection of the military. THE BLATES. Occasional fornishes in the Philadelphia Press an interesting remime of the political history of the Branz family. His influence se-curred the appointment of France to the best position in the army; but he soon quarreled with that unfortunate officer, and was well esed with his removal.

This opposition to Secretary Chase took shape very early. The bitter hostility to Stanton and Hour was prompted by their relusal to be dic-tated to in reference to appointments and proons. THE SOUTHERN METHODIST BINH-OP4 ON RE-UNION WITH THE CHURCH NORTH. Three of the Bishops, J. O. Andrew, PAINE and G. F. PIERCE, of the Methodist Episcopal Church south, have issued a pastoral address, dated at Columbus, Ga., Aug. 17, 1865. Allusion is made in the opening part of the address to the suffering caused by the war, and a hope expressed that peace will bring, in its train, spiritual blessings, and civil and social order. The people are exhorted to put away all bitterpess, and wrath and anger, and build up the waste places of the church. The end of the

and the moral training given to the slaves, has contributed, it is thought, very materially to their discreet and inoffensive

behaviour during the late rebellion. On the subject of re-union with the Church North, the address says that a dele gate from the Sonthern Church was refused admission into a convention of the Church North in 1848, and the bishops now would be excused from any farther reference to the subject. They feel bound to say :

"Since then the position of northern Methodists as towards us has been somewhat changed. Having agreed with us on a plan of separation into two independent ecclasiastical jurisdictions and for an equitable division of the church property, they afterwards sought to repudiste their covenant and to evade payment; and were only brought to settlement at the end of the law. This, though granted by themselves, who This, though granted by themselves, who were in a majority, and subsequently confirmed by the Supreme Court of the United States as the basis of our legal and constitutional rights; has been, whenever convenient, ignored by them."

The church North is charged with having endeavored, by misrepresentation, to fix without cause, the character of seces sionists and schismatics on the church South. The abolition of slavery now, ac cording to this address has nothing to de with the questions prominent in the sepation of 1844. It is evident, say these oishops, that a majority of the northern Methodists have become incurably radical; that they teach for doctrines the command ments of men; that they preach another gospel; that their pulpits are perverted t agitations of questions not healthful to personal piety, but promotive of political and ecclesiastical discord, rather than those cads for which the church was instituted and that they have gone on to impose con-

ditions on discipleship that Christ did no impose. The address says: "Such a change as we see no immediate prospect of, in their tone and temper an ipractice, must come before we can anticipate any good result from even entertaining the subject of remion with them. Fidelity to but has seems our providential mission requires that we preserve our distinct seems quires that we preserve our distinct eccle-siustical organization in all its vigor and "Integrity, free from all entangling alliance with those whose notions of philanthro and politics and social economy are liab and folines and social economy are liable to give an ever-varying complexion to their theology. Let us abide in our lot and be true to our calling, doing what we can to spread scriptural holineas through these lands, and so oppose the tide of fanalicism, which threatens our overflow."

The bishons say that the conduct of the Northern Methodis: bishops and preachers, 'in taking advantage of the confusion incid ent to a state of war to intrude themselves into several of our houses of worship, and their continuing to hold these places agains the wishes and protests of the congrega-tions and their rightful owners, causes us sorrow and pain, not only as working an injury to us, but as presenting to the world a speciacle ill calculated to make an impres

sion favorable to Christianity."

The Church South is warned to be on its guard against the action of the church North, which is charged with having inau gurated a systematic attempt to disturb, dis integrate and absorb the Southern member ship. Preachers are to be sent South and societies planted wherever there is an opening. This policy according to the bishop points evidently to the division, destruc non, and ecclesisstical devastation of th southern church.''

The Southern members are urged to submit cheerfuily and in good faith to the government of the United States. An enlightened conscience and sound judgment, call for this course.

Our readers can judge forthemselves o the patriotism good faith and chris lanity of the body which puts forth this address. A BIGHTEOUS VERDICT. Under this caption the New York Tribun

The jury in the Titusville case "do the control of one train, and neglected to announce its presence on the track, although they anew another train was approaching which had the right of way. But the verdict does not stop there. The jury declare "that the evidence shows that the President and Directors of said Oll Creek Railroad are criminally liable for the illing of the said E. Steele Greene, by refusing and neglecting to furnish reasonable and or-

modation tor passengers traveling over said toad.

The Tribinic asks how many rallroads in the vicinity of New York could escape on such an indiction as that. The verdict proceeds:
Said E. Steele Grane was compelled to stand on the platform of a passenger car, where he as crushed and injured and came to his death by the collision as before described, wh h would not have happened but for the refesal or neglect of said President and Directors" to sup-

ply as many, cars as the Superintendent and conductors declared necessary.

That completes the case sgainst the railroad officials, but the jury do not yet deem their duty discharged. They take one step further. "W therefore request the Corner to issue his warran for the apprehension and trial of said Joseph Funk and Patrick Carry tegether with the President, Directors and managers of the said Oil Creek Railroad, who by their culpable negli gence, as proved by the evidence, have caused the death of said deceased." And finally they arraign the whole management of the road a furnishing insufficient passenger and freight accommodation, and creating unnecessary risk of life and limb for the sake of saving a reasonabl
