What a party actually does, it is perfectly manifest that he can do, and we shall not quarrel there fore with the inference of an admission that a State can, in point of fact, seceds, just as a man may commit suicide, though all laws human and divine forbid it. That there States did commit spicide is admitted by President Jourson himself, in the assertion of the Proclamations, that they did thereby deprive themselves of all

And however we may personally feel as to the greatness of their offence, we have grave double whether, after the recognition of their belligerency, we can properly treat these men otherwise than as mere prisoners of war. If our own rebellion sgainst the mother country had failed after a seven years war, all Christendom would have revolted at the idea of hanging the leaders without reference to the ques tion whether there was a case to authorize it or not. There will be nothing lost therefore, in this view of the case, by giving up the point of treason, which the South itself is now so ready and eager to confess, just because it knows that this crime is to

This, however, is not the trouble. It is because only of the consequences that flow from the doctrine of conquest and subjection to the law of the conqueror, that after fighting us for four years on the argument that they were independent, and had a right to do so, they, and their advocates here, insist that they were never out at all.
