The ordinance offered in the Alaban

Convention relative to Slavery, read thus :

Be li Ordained. This as the institution of blavery has been abollated, hereafter there shall be neither elavery nor involuntary ser-vitude in this State otherwise, than for the Dunishment of crimes, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted. This is, we believe, the language of the Mississippi Ordinance; and it is worthy of note that the future prohibition of Slavery As here made to depend solely upon the facts That "the institution of Slavery has been abolished." It does not say when, where, or ly what authority has been abolished

but simply reciting it as a fact, bases the future prohibition of Slavery thereon. Now, suppose it should hereafter be declded that Slavery has not been abolished by competent authority; will the prohibion fall with the asserted fact on which it is based? The question is worthy of grave

The only all-sufficient authority for the mplete abolition of slavery—an authority which all will be compelled to acknowledge is the pending amendment to the Consti-United States We hold, in common with a great mass of the people, hat Slavery has been abolished by the events of the war; but there are many who do not coincide in that view, and who smaintain that Slavery still has a legal and constitutional existence. There is consequently no authority for its abolition that will not be questioned, except the amendmen' to the Constitution.

It is to be observed, moreover, that the inance we have quoted leaves this an open question. It does not say how slavery has been aboltahed; and its silence on this subject would seem to imply an intention to leave the question open with the reserved purpose of raising this very point hereafter. Now, the Constitutional amendment has not yet been adopted by a majority of all the States as they stood before the war. Once admit the Southern States to their old places, and it never will be adopted. When that result has been attained, and the Constitutional amendment forever defeated, then comes up the question whether this continguent prohibition of slavery, based upon a fact that (it will be alleged) was not a fact, is not simply equivalent to no hibition at all. Can we doubt how outhern courts would decide such a ques-
