We were not among those who expected a different result in that State, nor do we feel cast down or dismayed by it in the least. Truth is mighty and will prevail. . Some of the "conservative" presses hav

been weak enough to agree that if the peo-ple of Connecticut will not do justice to the negro, the people of the South, with all justly be expected to do any better. This is a good argument: but as it tells against the Conservatives, they are the last who ald urge it.

No party, other than the Conservatives, has proposed to leave this question in the hands of the Southern people; and it did not need the election in Connec leut to there. I is simply because we know, and because every body knows that he Southern people can not be relied upon of their own motives, to do justice to the negro that we have protested against leaving the matter to them to decide without compul

We believe that Congress and the Presi dent have the same power to exact negro suffrage from the Southern States that they have to exact the abolition of slavery. No one believes that the Southern States would have abolished slavery, if left to their own free will; but the government required it, as a sine qua non to their return and they have complied, because they cannot help it

There is precisely the same power to exact negro sufirage as a condition precedent to their return, and we believe should be exacted, while we have the power, because; first, it is right, and second, i will never be conceeded except upon such compulation.

-APPRENTICESHIP SYSTEM. There is nothing which detracts so much from the credit of mechanical skill in the United States as the lax system of apprenticeship which prevails, or rather the entire want of system. In Europe no mechanic can work at his

trade who has not served a regular appren ticeship thereto, and that apprenticeship is prolonged and exacting. In this country an apprentice simply serves as long as h pleases. The consequence is that while we have many skilled mechanics, who conscientiously serve long enough to learn their art effectually, we have many more in every trade, who have acquired but a smattering of knowledge in their craft. Such a state of things is as injurious the men themselves as to the trade they profess: and the only cure for it is the adop tion of an effective system of apprentice ship. It is a very rare thing, ind to see an apprentice's indenture; and until we do see that class of papers, and see them hedged about with legal sanctions and penalties, we shall have to endere the disadvan

tages of the present system. The consideration of this matter has been breached by the mechanics themselves and it behoves them to press its considera tion, until the proper legislation is obtained. There are, we know, many difficulties in the way, but the chief difficulty is in making a beginning in the right direction. The first thing to be done, in our view, is to provide legal sanction and protection to written articles of apprenticeship, under which the apprentics may be pro ected from oppression and at the same time compelled to serve out his term of apprentice ahip. That point once attained, almost every thing else desirable would naturally
