> HAVE THE CONDITIONS BEEN MET! In the various proclamation; issued by the President, appointing Provisional Governors in the Southern States, and authorizing the formation of new State Constitutions, certain conditions and limitations were named by him, to be observed by those to whom they were addressed. These roclamations each distinctly declare that its object is "to enable the loyal people of aid State to organize a State Government. whereby justice may be established, domes c tranquility insured, and loyal citizens notected in all their rights of life, liberty and property." If the Constitution to be framed by any convention does not secure that objec, in the judgment of President Johnson, he will have the same right to reject the action of the convention that he

originally had to authorize it. Have these conditions been met? Has a sirgie State, in revising its Constitution, taken any steps "whereby justice may be stablished, or loyal citizens protected in all or any of) their rights of life, liberty and property?" We do not know of one. Mississir I has not done it; for not only are the mafority of her[loyal]citizens left without protection to life and liberty, but they are denied the right to hold property, and it seems even doubtful if they will be allowed to testify in courts of justice. ALABAMA has not done it; for her loyal citizens are left to exact their rights to life, liberty and property as they best can hereafter. South CAROLINA has not done it; for beyond submitting to the abolition of slavery as unavoidable, she has done nothing towards rotecting the majority of her citizens. And so of all the rest.

Congress, will, therefore, be perfectly ustifiable in referring the whole matter back to these States, until they learn to comply, literally and liberally, with the President's conditions.
