The complete restoration of loyalty, as shown by an honest recognition of the unity of the Fepublic and the duty of allegiance to it at all times, without mental reservation or equivocation of any kind.

The complete suppression of all oligarchical pretensions, and the complete enfranchisement of all citizens, so that there shall be no denial of rights on account of color or race, but justice shall be impartial, and all shall be equal before the law.

The rejection of the rebal debt, and at the same time, the adoption, in just proportion, of the national debt and the national obligations to Union soldiers, with solemn promises never to join in any measure, direct or indirect, for their repudiation, or in any way tending to impair the national endits.

The cohoce of citizens for office, whether State or national, of constant and undoubted loyalty, whose conduct and conversation give assurance of peace and reconciliation.


