Afternoon Dispatches.

Harrisburg, Jan. 6.

The Senate Republican caucus yesterday afternoon nominated for Speaker, Wilmer Worthington of Chester; Chief Clerk, G. W. Hammersley of Philadelphia; Assistant Clerk, Lucius Rogers of KeKean, and F. H. Braggins of Mercer; Sergeant-at-Arms, Wm. A. Rupert of Crawford; Transcribing Clerks, Ebenezer Williams of Pittsburgh; H. C. Bosler of Montgomery; Charles Williams of Philadelphia, and J. Anderson of Beaver. No other officers were nominated, as there was a difficulty in caucus, and they were postponed, and a committee on the slate appointed.

E. H. Rouch and T. B. Cochran, of Lancaster had submitted a proposition to do the pasting of the Senate at \$2,506 and the House at \$5,000, both at \$7,000, which was rejected in both caucuses. They state that the present expenses of pasting and folding in the House alone is \$37,000.

The House Republican caucus yesterday evening nominated the following gentlemen: Speaker—John Clark, of Philadelphia; Chief Clerk—General James Selridge, of Northampton; Resident Clerk, John A. Small, of Harrisburg; Assistant Clerk, E. G. Lee, of Philadelphia; Transcribing Clerks, F. A. Magee, of Pittsburgh; Burritt, W. B. Irvin, J. D. Miller, R. Bernhard, Chas. Nibbs, George N. Baker, of Lancaster; Postmaster, A. G. Henry, of Armstrong; Assistant, A. W. Kimmell, of Indiana; Messenger, James McCalley, of Philadelphia; Door-keeper of the Rotunda, James McDermott, of Washington; Chief of Folding department, Wm. McLaughlin; Assistant, John Darrah.

Augusta, Me., Jan. 6.

The Legislature of Maine convened to-day. The question of the United States Senatorship is attracting great attention. The candidates are Hon. L. M. Morrill and Hon. Hannibal Hamlin. The contest promises to be a hard one, but present indications point to the nomination of Mr. Hamlin.

Concord, N. H., Jan. 5.

The Republican State Convention meets here Thursday. There will be no contest over the nominee for Governor, as it is conceded to Mr. Stearns.

London, Jan. 6.

The latest news received here from Africa confirms the recent report relative to the safety of the great African traveler, Dr. Livingstone. It is said he is somewhere in the vicinity of Lake Zanzibar. Owing to it is thought, to the wars between the native tribes, his progress has been impeded, and consequently he has been unable to reach the sea coast.

Albany, Jan. 6.

The Legislature convened yesterday, and Gov. Hoffman delivered his message. The State debt at the end of the fiscal year was \$38,864,448, which the sinking funds, if not diminished, will at present rate of application extinguish within nine years.
