Afternoon Dispatches.

St. Louis, Jan. 12

The Leavenworth Commercial says: a man named Hayes was recently murdered at Hayes City, Kansas, by three negro soldiers belonging to the 38th Infantry. The murderers were arrested and lodged in jail, preparatory to trial, but during the night were taken from the prison by a vigilance committee and hung to the nearest tree.

Trouble between the white and negro soldiers at Fort Larned has also occurred, and conflicts have become so frequent and serious that the negroes had to be removed from the post and quartered at a distance from it.

The colored people of this city celebrated yesterday the anniversary of the emancipation of slaves in Missouri, by a large procession in the afternoon and presented a fine appearance. The celebration closed with a grand ball in the evening.

Cleveland, Jan. 12.

The Herald of the 11th contains the protest of Jas. F. Clark, J. N. McCullough, and B. F. Jones, directors of the Cleveland & Pittsburg Railroad, against the action of the new board of directors taken Jan. 6th, consisting of resolutions making a scrip dividend of 15 per cent., cash dividend of 2 per cent., issue of five millions bonds, abrogating all existing by-laws, appointing an Executive Committee empowered to make a financial agent with the right to hold the funds of the company without giving bonds, double tracking the road, appropriating five hundred thousand dollars to be placed in the hands of the financial agent to pay attorney fees, &c.

Chicago, Jan. 12.

A current rumor says Father McMullen, who went to Rome two months ago to complain against Bishop Duggan, of this Diocese, has obtained an order from the Propaganda office the Bishop to appear before the Council and show cause why he removed Father McMullen, Rola and McGarrah.

The Superintendent of St. Paul is to be impeached for refusing to countermand the city bonds for the Superior R. R. on technical grounds.

Mr. Leonard Chadwick may have been seen almost any day for many years past propelling his velocipede over the execrable pavements of that city, carrying pretty heavy loads and making pretty fair time. Mr. Chadwick says that on a good hard road he will pass any horse that travels. He has, on the smooth turnpikes of England, gone seventy miles a day on his "tricycle," and not felt the fatigue greatly. He has often gone to Hoboken from Paterson, on the plank road, in two hours.
