Afternoon Dispatches.

Harrisburgh, Jan. 25.

Senator Lowry was attacked with a stroke of paralysis of the right side yesterday at dinner. He is much easier to-day, and it is hoped will soon recover.

London, Jan. 25.

Buffalo, Jan. 25.

Cassius M. Andrews, aged 22 years, being from Illinois, was arrested here Saturday afternoon, when about taking the train for Chicago, charged with passing some thirty forged checks on business houses. Andrews has been visiting relations here for the last three months. His trunk was well stocked with clothing, furs, &c., obtained by means of forged checks. He has been committed to jail for further examination.

Philadelphia, Jan. 25.

In order to test the fact that the fire in the burnt block was not caused by the explosion of a boiler, steam was raised this morning in boiler among the ruins, proving that it was not injured. The origin of the fire is still a mystery, though it is generally supposed to have been the work of design for the purpose of robbing the store during the confusion that would follow.

Indianapolis, Jan. 25.

Boston, Jan. 25.

The extensive pork packing and lard establishment of Boynton, Swallow & Co., in Brighton, was destroyed by fire Sunday night. The loss was \$50,000, on which there is a partial insurance.

Hamilton, Jan. 25.

Reid's extensive cabinet warehouse and factory were partly destroyed by fire on Saturday night. The loss \$15,000.

SUDDENLY BECAME RICH.

Judge Latrobe a well-known American jurist, died some time since in Europe while traveling on the continent, and it was ascertained at the time his will was read that he had bequeathed a considerable amount of his property to Miss Verdell S. Geller, of Cumberland county, Pa. The matter was the subject of several articles at the time in the New York paper, but as time passed on and nothing further was heard in relation to the matter, the truth of the news of the young lady's good fortune began to be doubted. Recently, however, all doubts have been set at rest by the arrival of the papers of administration of Judge Latrobe's estate, and it is proved by them that Miss Geller has fallen heir to a large portion of the Judge's very valuable property, and that the lady is now independently wealthy for life.
