Afternoon Dispatches.

Tronto, N. J., Jan. 27.
John H. Stockton was elected U. S. Senator yesterday.

Providence, R. I., Jan. 27.
A factory girl named Slattery obtained \$3,000 against B. Fanning to-day in a case of breach of promise.

Paris, Jan. 27.
Later Rio de Janeiro advises state the Paraguayan army was defeated in the battle of Villeta.

London, Jan. 27.
The steamship *Periere*, which sailed on the 15th for New York, returned to Brest to-day in a damaged condition, having had six persons killed on board and several injured. No particulars. Mr. Green, of Louisville, son of Gen. N. Green, a passenger, is safe. It is supposed the accident occurred in the engine room.

Madrid, Jan. 27.
The Governor of Burgos was assassinated on the 25th when about to take an inventory of the goods in the cathedral in that city. The excitement is intense. The people generally sustain the government, and many arrests of suspected parties have been made.

Washington, Jan. 27.
The Republican Senators in caucus to day voted not to confirm any more nominations by President Johnson except in cases of imperative necessity.

It is announced the citizens of Washington, without respect to party, are determined to have an inauguration ball.

New York, Jan. 27.
The Tribune's Washington dispatch has the following: Gen. Grant is strongly opposed to the pending Alabama claim treaty. The following is the position towards it in his own words: "The treaty is unjust to the United States, because it assumes to measure the injury inflicted upon this country by the money value of ships actually destroyed, whereas the chief damage to our commerce was in our ships being driven from the seas by Angle-Rebel pirates, in addition to the sympathy extended by the English Government to the South, prolonged the war at least a year, and for all lives lost and money expended for this time England is directly responsible. The treaty proposes to settle all these things by the payment of the value of a few ships."

The Times' Washington dispatch has a similar paragraph, and says: This seems to indicate that Reverdy Johnson will be recalled at no very distant day, and that the entire question will be reopened on a totally different basis under the new administration.

The Lawrence, Mass., American (General Bank's District) of the 23d inst., referring to the controversy about General Banks having been ordered to supersede General Grant says: We happen personally to know that the official autograph orders are now in the hands of General Grant.

Three burglars, with stolen property in their possession valued at \$3,000, were arrested by Capt. Jordan Monday, and on Sunday evening three others were captured by Sergeant Woodward and his assistants.

All these parties, who are supposed to constitute regular burglars in gang, were committed to await trial.

During Saturday night between \$2,000 and \$3,000 worth of silks were stolen by burglars from a store in Cutham street, and the thieves escaped with their plunder.

The typhoid fever was reported under thorough control.

Of the 213,684 emigrants who arrived here last year 65,714 remained in this State, 34,822 went to Illinois, 3,115 to Utah, and 5 to New Mexico, while all the lately rebellious States received an aggregate of only 23,111.

Freight for Salt Lake is now being sent from New York city to the end of the Pacific Railroad without change of cars—2,500 miles. New York "Red Line" cars are seen west of the Rocky Mountains. We have now the longest line of continuous railroad track in the world.
