# TELEGRAPH

### Afternoon Dispatches.

Albany, Jan. 29.

At the State Workingmen's Assembly yesterday a resolution was adopted that a committee be appointed to draft a bill to be presented to the Legislature, providing that all apprentices shall receive not less than five years at a trade.

The question of industrial partnership between employer and employee was discussed yesterday.

The Labor Committee reported in favor of the total abolition of prison labor, but the report was recommitted for modification.

Milwaukee, Jan. 29.

Physicians have visited Mira Housch, of Burlington, Wis., who has been in a trance since Jan. 9th. From a vein tapped by them blood flowed as from a living person.

Syracuse, Jan. 29.

The State Wool Growers' Association held their annual meeting at City Hall yesterday. Perry S. Randall presided. George Gedder introduced a resolution denouncing the proposed reciprocity treaty with Canada as destructive to the interests of the United States. It was decided to hold a fair this year. The officers of last year were re-elected. Resolutions were adopted against the reduction of tariff on wool by treaty or otherwise.

St. Louis, Jan. 29.

C. B. Cranson, freight agent of the Ohio & Mississippi Railroad, formerly of Lockport, N. Y., attempted suicide Wednesday by shooting himself through the head, and also in the left side, while laboring under despondency induced by sickness.

General Sherman and his Secretary, Col. Dayton, with their families, left for New Orleans yesterday.

The statement made Wednesday that General Sheridan is daily expected to return from the Plains, is incorrect.

A resolution was introduced in the Legislature Wednesday providing for the admission of members to the House elected from counties the election returns which were not counted by the Secretary of State, was tabled. It was thought by members that the decisions of the Supreme Court in the Blood v. Blood case entitled those members to seats; but the House decided against them.

Miss Augusta M. St. Clair, the lecturer, died at Salt Lake Wednesday.

An Omaha dispatch says a large number of Indians are hunting on the Republican. Acting Gov. Hall, of Colorado, has issued a proclamation warning the military or citizens from interference, as the Utes are friendly and have a treaty with the Government.

Atlanta, Jan. 29.

In the Senate a resolution to furnish protection to persons driven from their homes on account of politics was tabled. In the House a resolution to investigate the charges of lawlessness in Warren and other counties was rejected 54 to 49. A resolution to appoint a committee to proceed to Washington and confer with Congress with the view to the releasing of the negroes in the Legislature was referred.

It is reported that the Constitutional Convention of Georgia will soon reassemble. It is also reported that the Legislature will permit a Commission to go to Washington in connection with the reconstruction measures of Congress.

Cleveland, Jan. 29.

At the annual meeting of the Cleveland and Mahoning Railroad yesterday, the stockholders voted to sustain the action of the directors in protesting against the transfer of the lease by the Atlantic & Great Western to the Erie Railroad. The New board was authorized to take measures to receive the control of the road, it being claimed that under the laws of Ohio, the Atlantic & Great Western has forfeited its lease of the Cleveland & Mahoning Railroad by attempting to transfer to a corporation outside of Ohio.

Detroit is to have a \$550,000 Masonic temple.
