Afternoon Dispatches.

Madrid, Jan. 30.

It is stated that the members of the Provisional Government are unanimously in favor of Duke Montpensier for the Spanish throne.

London, Jan. 30.

An invitation has been extended to Rev. J. Johnson to dine with the corporation authorities of Glasgow in February. He has accepted the invitation.

United States Minister Tuckerman, in a speech delivered at a public dinner in Athens Thursday, expressed the kindest feelings of the American nation for Greece, pledged the cordial sympathy of his Government for the Greeks in their anticipated trouble with the Turks.

Athens, Jan. 30.

The action of the King of Greece upon the terms submitted by the recent Conference is considered uncertain, and nothing definite as to his intention relative to the matter is at yet known.

Toronto, Jan. 30.

A dispatch from Ottawa says Mr. Howe and Sir John McDonald have settled the Nova Scotia question so far as principles are concerned, a few details only remaining to be arranged.

Bellows Falls, Vt., Jan. 30.

Wenton and suite have arrived at this place. He is a few hours behind time in consequence of the bad condition of the roads. He has averaged 20 miles a day since he left Bangor.

Montreal, Jan. 30.

The billiard match was won by Dion, he scoring 1,200 to Foster's 1,116. Average 362.

A private soldier of the United States army, named Francis Gasson, at present stationed at Marion, Va., has just fallen heir to \$18,000 in gold.

Minneapolis refuses to allow a track through Second street to unite the main line of the St. Paul and Pacific Railroad with the Milwaukee and St. Paul.

A farmer's convention, to last four days, began at Augusta, Maine, on Tuesday morning. They discussed potato culture and exhibited sixty varieties.

Abel W. Erskine's barn, in Somerville, Maine, was burned with nineteen head of cattle, on Monday morning. Loss, nearly four thousand dollars.

A number of negroes and a few whites in Petersburg, Va., have formed an association for the impartial relief of the suffering poor of that city.

An enterprising genius in San Francisco has invented an infernal machine, which he is testing by placing it on the track of a street railroad. He blew up a carload of people, but they didn't mind it. They thought the shock only an earthquake. The machine resembles an old-fashioned watch, being about two inches in diameter and five-eighths of an inch in thickness. It was composed of Russia sheet iron, with two strong clasps of lead, by which it was secured to the railroad track. Fixed in the interior of the torpedo, and nearly reaching its upper surface, were three gun-ripples, soldered to the lower plate. They were armed with ordinary percussion caps, and were exploded by the car wheels passing over them. The machine was filled, of course with some powerful explosive mixture.
