Afternoon Dispatches.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 1.
 No decision has yet been made in the injunction case against the Chatham Railroad. Rumor says, however, that the decision will be in favor of sustaining the injunction. If so, all similar appropriations with the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford, and the Western North Carolina roads are among those which would be sustained in the Senate. To-day the corruption matter was discussed, and Mr. Sweet made a long speech imputing corruption to leading parties. The Senate adjourned without action. The House proceedings are unimportant.

Danby, Vt., Feb. 1.
 Weston, reached Manchester near the foot of the Green Mountains, early this morning. He encountered numerous obstacles, and was nearly all night in crossing. He said he had to stop at a farm house near the summit to rest the horses and obtain fresh ones. The snow was six feet deep and in enormous drifts in some places along the road. He will arrive at Rutland to-night.

Albany, Feb. 1.
 After electing officers Saturday the State Workingmen's Assembly adjourned sine die.

New York, Feb. 1.
 The Herald's special from Richmond says: A dispatch from Goldsboro, N. C., states that the greatest excitement prevails at Kingsion in consequence of the lynching of the five prisoners there Friday night. The names of the victims were Rupert Nobles, (white) Robert Grady, John Miller, L. Harrig, and Daniel Smith, colored. A person near by the scene heard the discharging of the pistols as the prisoners were shot in the bridge and the splashing of the bodies as they were thrown into the river. Kingsion is in a state of siege by the negroes of the surrounding country, who threaten to liberate the remaining negroes in jail and burn it down. The whites are all armed with such weapons as are at their command guarding their houses. Pickets are stationed in the suburbs at night.

Another horrible outrage occurred in Duplin county. A white man, who fired upon a party of negroes who were attempting to violate the person of some young ladies, was murdered in his house the following night and his body cut in halves and hung up in the same room in which he slept. No arrests have been made in either of these cases. Lawlessness and anarchy exist in this entire section of the country to such an extent as to justify the ordering out and arming of the militia by the Governor. The civil authorities are powerless to suppress these heinous crimes.

The treasury officials are engaged in examining the extent of the drawback frauds in the New York Custom House. Investigation thus far shows they possibly reach \$1,000. It is estimated that one half of the more recent claims, judging from the character of the papers on file here, are bogus. The fraud has been carried on for two years, with boldness and impunity.

The annual list of the telegraphers last night was one of the most brilliant of the season. Many prominent members of the press and eminent telegraphers were present.

Near Owensboro, Kentucky, some days ago, a negro was lynched by a mob.

Isabella is sending emissaries to Spain in her behalf and intriguing to return to the throne.

Captain Reed, of the Memphis fire department, injured by falling from his horse, Thursday, died that night.

Colonel Jesse McMahon, an old and well known editor, but lately an agent of the St. Louis Life Insurance Company, died in Memphis, Friday, of congestive chills.

The Paris Monitor says the incessant encroachments of Russia in Central Asia have led to "representations" on the part of English ambassador of St. Petersburg.

The consul of France to Shanghai, China, has been appointed consul general of France at New York, in place of Gaudreec Bouteau, now ambassador at Santiago.

At Burlington, Wisconsin, Miss Rausch, a little girl who excited much interest as a remarkable case of suspended animation, has been found to be dead. It is supposed that she lay in a trance at least twelve days previous to her death.

In reply to a letter from the democrats of Pesth, Garibaldi has written a letter, dated Caprea, December 22, in which he advises the Hungarians to separate from Austria, by whom, he says, they are sure to be betrayed.

Two young ladies were seen on the streets of Dubuque, the other day, whose hats were prairie chickens! The featherly article was prepared as a taxidermist would prepare them before mounting, and stuffed with young ladies' heads.

Edwin Hodges, of Florence, Benton county, Iowa, died recently, of poison supposed to have administered by an Irish neighbor with whom he had had a law suit. The unfortunate man was married on Christmas.
