Afternoon Dispatches.

London, Feb. 5.
Despatches from Athens announce the probable adherence of Greece to the protocol of the Conference.

The appeal recently made in the case of Costello, the American citizen convicted of conspiracy in the Fenian revolt, has been denied.

Madrid, Feb. 5.
Bands of Carlists have made their appearance in Catalonia. They came from the valley of Andorra, and seek to produce a rising against the provisional Government.

Troops have been sent out to disperse them. The press of the city fearing civil war, urge the government to take active measures, and the people to unite against the reactionary party.

Paris, Feb. 5.
Late South American advices say it is reported that the Brazilian force has gone to Asuncion to establish a provisional government.

St. Louis, Feb. 5.
A delegation of prominent ladies of St. Louis arrived at Jefferson City Wednesday with a petition from the Women's Suffrage Association of Missouri, asking the Legislature to provide for the amendment of the State Constitution so as to strike out the word "male" from that instrument. The petition was presented yesterday, at which time addresses were made by some of the ladies on the subject of female suffrage.

Montreal, Feb. 5.
While a concert and ball at St. Patrick's Hall was in progress yesterday evening, 2,000 persons present, a cry was raised that the roof was giving way. All rushed for the street, but while the last were getting out several persons were injured, but it is hoped no one was killed.

The snow storm continues with great fury, and travel is stopped.

Memphis, Feb. 5.
An affair occurred at a Catholic fair night before last in which Wm. Rice, a well known sporting man, formerly of New Orleans, was stabbed and probably mortally wounded by a drunken man named Tim. McGrath, who was arrested after a terrible resistance, being knocked senseless by the police after three of them had been badly cut. McGrath was committed to jail.

Philadelphia, Feb. 5.
A large dry goods jobbing house failed here yesterday. Liabilities are said to be \$300,000, \$70,000 of which are due on a house in this city.

New York, Feb. 5.
F. B. Pinto, the Park Bank robber, was yesterday sentenced to five years in the State prison.

There is at present at the Tombs 12 murderers, two of whom are women. Most of these prisoners were arrested during the past month.

It is stated that additional facts have been obtained clearly establishing that Maher, now under arrest, was the murderer of Rogers.

A severe storm commenced here yesterday. The thunder storm extended throughout New England Wednesday night. A heavy snow fell in Maine and the roads are blocked.

In the Tyrolean mountains it is the custom of the women and children to come out when it is bed-time, and sing their national songs until their husbands, fathers and brothers answer them from the hill, or on the return home. On the shores of the Adriatic such a custom prevails. There the wives of the fishermen come down about sunset and sing a melody. After singing the first stanza they listen awhile for the answering strain from off the water, and continue to sing and listen till the well-known voices come borne on the tide, telling that the loved ones are almost home.

How sweet to the weary fishermen, as the shadows gather around him, must be the songs of the loved ones at home, who sing to cheer him, and how they strengthen and tighten the bonds that bind together these humble dwellers by the sea. Truly it is among the lowly of this world that we find some of the most beautiful customs in practice.

A felon often gives the greatest distress and pain. To cause it to break, construct a leather thimble, fill it with soap and lime mixed together, then thrust into the thimble the finger or thumb that may be affected.

After the felon breaks, dress it with a poultice made from the pulp of roasted socke root, the effect of which will be most soothing and delightful. A cure soon follows.

In some parts of the country this plant goes by the name of "poke," instead of socke, the true name. It bears numerous clusters of purplish berries, which pigeons and other birds are very fond of.
