There is considerable excitement in Nova Scotia over recent discoveries of gold in Fosters river, and many people are preparing to go there as soon as spring opens.

Pollman Jansen, charged with having shot a hackman who was driving fast, has been sentenced by the Chicago Police Commission to suspension for twenty days. The hackman is still disabled.

Ticket holders in Gardner's lottery held an indignation meeting in St. Louis on Monday night, and appointed a committee to see the managers of the scheme and compel them to have the drawing or discharge.

George B. Cross, ex-p. of Mr. Gilead, Morrow county, Ohio, is now serving his thirty-sixth consecutive year as Justice of the Peace, and during that time has succeeded the township more than twenty years.

A suit, brought by the St. Louis Gas Light Company to recover \$100,000, alleged to be due for lighting the streets in 1866, is being tried. The defense set up by the city is that the gas furnished was of an inferior quality, and not complying with the contract. The case will occupy several days.

The Union Pacific Railroad is still blocked up with snow for many miles. No trains have passed either way from Washach since the 12th of February. The latest overland advices received at San Francisco from New York are to the sixth inst.
