THE DARIEN SHIP CANAL.—The building of this canal will be no holiday work. There will be difficulty in procuring laborers. The malaria will deter Americans. It is also urged that even when the canal is finished it will be available for steamers only; that under ordinary circumstances sailing vessels could go around the horn more safely and profitably. In short, the opinion of many competent business engineers is that the canal does not promise favorably as a business speculation, and that it will not pay for any company of private individuals or any single government to attempt it. It has been plausibly suggested that it would be better for all the maritime nations of the world to attempt the work and hold it as a joint property, to be free to the trade of all, and only such tolls charged as may be necessary to meet the expense of maintaining and repairing the works.

At last he wrote to his wife that he had received a leave of absence, and would certainly be home on the following Thursday, and he wanted her to meet him at the train. The next day, instead of starting for home, the battle of Gettysburg was fought, and he was among the slain. The news of his death came, and since that time his devoted wife has been crazy, and still expects her husband on the train, and by day and night—in all kinds of weather—stands in the middle of the crossing in front of her house, looking in every direction for the approach of him who will never come again. Often she will call upon the Mayor and other city authorities to have officers detailed to go and watch 'that train,' to see if her husband is not coming. This strange conduct has lasted for almost six years, and the grief and troubles of the poor woman have been so great, that she has turned prematurely gray, and although under thirty years of age, has the appearance of a very old person.

VOLTAIRE'S DEATH BED.—The United States Consul at Moscow, Mr. Eugene Schuyler, it is announced, has discovered among the Russian archives, a contemporary account of the occurrences at the death of Voltaire. The paper was written by Prince Ivan Barantinsky, the Russian Ambassador at Paris, and transmitted to the Empress Catharine II. The writer says that knowing the great interest that the Empress took in Voltaire, he had the account prepared by a person who was well acquainted with the details. This person from internal evidence, appears to have been the physician in attendance. The account is very long, filling three columns of the Debats newspaper. Voltaire, it appears, rejected religious consolation, and repulsed the clergyman, exclaiming, "Let me die in peace." His last words were, "Take care of Maria," meaning his niece, Madame Denys. The body, after being embalmed, was carried to the Abbey of Cellieres, and when laid in the grave was covered with two feet of quick lime. The full account was published under the supervision of Henry Taine, the well known author of the History of English Literature, to whom the document was transmitted by Mr. Schuyler.
