Afternoon Dispatches.

New York, March 27.

The Tribune's Havana special says: The Spaniards are secretly urging the home government to arm the blacks.

Chicago, March 26.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., March 27.

Montague Dean, a convict in Sing Sing prison, died yesterday from cruelty received at the hands of one of the keepers named Buckingham. The latter has been removed, but not arrested.

An Omaha dispatch says: Advice from the Upper Missouri Reservation state that great dissatisfaction exists among the Indians and at the manner in which the treaties are being carried out. It is said that even Spotted Tail was complaining. An early outbreak is feared.

James Middleton and John Mahoney fought half a dozen rounds in a prize fight near Bunker Hill, Charleston, yesterday morning, in the presence of two hundred roughs. The appearance of the police stopped the fight, but no arrests were made.

WE like to record a good action by one who is regarded as a bad man, and in doing it we are led to inquire if it is probable that the average of good men, after all, do better. The case in point is this: A gentleman walking down or up Broadway, a short time since, was accosted by a woman, aged about 35 years, and showing some traces of former beauty, who asked for assistance for herself, husband, and sick children. Not turning a deaf ear at once, he proposed to accompany the applicant to her home, and if her story was true offered relief. She readily assented, and they soon reached a miserable tenement house. The gentleman promptly sent for a physician, and then gave the woman a roll of bills, which on opening she found to amount to the sum of fifty dollars. He waited until the physician arrived, when he ordered him to attend to the suffering family and send its bill to him. The humanitarian refused to give the woman his name, but the husband recognized in their visitor no other than John Morrisey, Member of Congress.
