TELEGRAPH

REPORTED FOR THE DAILY RECORD.

Afternoon Dispatches.

Salem, O., March 27.

Thomas J. Woods, editor of the Ohio Patriot, and a prominent politician of Columbiana county, died here yesterday.

San Francisco, March 27.

The steamer Herman was wrecked February 15th on an unknown reef outside the harbor of Yokohama. Two hundred and seventy lives were lost. The vessel is a total loss—nothing whatever saved.

Worcester, Mass., March 27.

A colored man was lying in the Norwich depot, in this city, yesterday afternoon, who died soon after without being able to give any account of himself. He has been identified as J. B. Anderson, of Cambridge.

Richmond, Va., March 27.

Gen. Stoneman, to-day issued an order removing Gov. Welles and assuming the duties himself. Mayor Burgess, of Petersburg, was also removed.

Boston, March 27.

Orders have been received at Portsmouth Navy Yard to fit the United States steamer Galena for sea. It is supposed her destination is Cuba.

Hartford, March 27.

A firm of this city have received a contract to build a granite and marble mausoleum to the memory of Dean Richmond, of New York, at a cost of \$28,000.

Havana, March 27.

The steamer Commodore, which left here last Wednesday for Cardinas, was seized by several of the passengers, who proved to be patriots. The lady passengers were safely landed, with a portion of the crew and captain, on a Key near Cardinas, when the captors took the steamer, it is supposed, to Nassau.

LATER.

Havana, March 27.

The steamer Commodore, which was taken possession of by her passengers, carried but one day's supply of coal. Vessels which arrived to-day report seeing her off Strup Key under sail. Others report seeing her anchored off the Bahama Banks, one hundred miles from Nassau. A Spanish man-of-war has gone in pursuit of her.

The walking match for \$500 a side, between the famous Weston, (backed by the Taylor Bros. of the Taylor House, Fredonia) and Payne, of Buffalo, is to come off on Tuesday and Wednesday next. They leave Walnut Creek, about ten miles west of Erie, at two o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, for the Buffalo post office, a distance of 103 miles. They will be attended by judges and referees in separate carriages. They start together, on a trial of speed, without regard to the time occupied. The prospect is they will have a "soft" walk of it.

A submarine drill has been invented by a New York machinist, with which, it is claimed, a hole an inch in diameter can be drilled five feet deep, in one hour, to any reasonable depth under water. The bit is of conical form, over an inch in diameter, and studded with black diamonds.
