The Home-Petroleum Company struck a new eighty barrel well on the Blood Farm, day before yesterday.

Three new wells are in process of drilling on West Hickory Creek, near the Beatty Farm. They will be completed within the next three or four weeks.

It is stated that the Cory machine works, which are now turning out 250 Oliver mowers a week, are to be enlarged, so as to employ one thousand men and turn out one thousand mowers per week.

A new well was struck, about one week ago on the J. Buchanan Farm at Rouseville. It is owned by O. Strong & Sons, and is producing about ten barrels per day.

The well owned by Mr. Al. Hoover on the McMillan farm, Scrubgrass, which was struck about two weeks ago, is now yielding forty barrels per day.

The new well on Holmden Run near Pihole, struck about one month ago, is producing a mixture of green and black oil. The production is about twenty barrels per day.
