THE LATEST SNAKE STORY.

An Ocean of Snakes. A ship sailing through a Whirling Mass of the Reptiles. The statement published in last Sunday's Times that the steamship Mexico, Captain Pitfield, when on her last trip, off the Tortugas, steamed through a tangled mass of snakes of all sizes, has since been the subject of much merriment.

The original account was incorrect in one particular only. Instead of two hours and a half as stated, the Mexico was no more than one hour and a half in passing through that horrible mass of writhing reptiles.

The greatest interest—was natural—was manifested by those on board the Mexico. Discipline was, for a space, forgotten, and captains, officers, passengers, crew and ship boys stood in common, on the deck, looking on a sight that, so far as is seen by sea-animals, has never yet been witnessed by those who have gone down to the sea in ships.

Seriously speaking, however, the presence of these snakes in the waters off the Tortugas is a remarkable occurrence, one that may properly claim the attention of the scientific. One fact, at least is proven. That fact is that under skins special revelation of the laws ordinarily controlling them snakes may live in salt water.
