Margaret Murray, an inmate of the Nunnery in Pittsburgh, attempted suicide yesterday, but was rescued.

A duel was fought yesterday between a Spaniard and Cuban at New Orleans, growing out of the cries of "Death to the Spaniards!" in a recent procession of Cubans and their sympathizers. The Cuban is badly wounded and the Spaniard is unharmed. A general challenge has been extended from a Spaniard to all who indulged in the cries during the procession. Another duel is reported as already arranged.

A large number of delegates composed of prominent citizens of Knoxville leave to-day for Cincinnati to represent the interests of East Tennessee in the Cincinnati, Knoxville & Charleston Railroad.

More seizures of consignments of coffee and sugar were made by the United States revenue officer at St. Louis, yesterday morning. It is said that about 5500 sacks of coffee, 500 bags of pepper, and several hundred boxes of sugar, have been sent there from New Orleans on none of which has duty been paid.

Leopold Hollerman, Clerk of Murdock & Dipon, St. Louis, was arrested yesterday charged with embezzling between two and three thousand dollars from that firm.

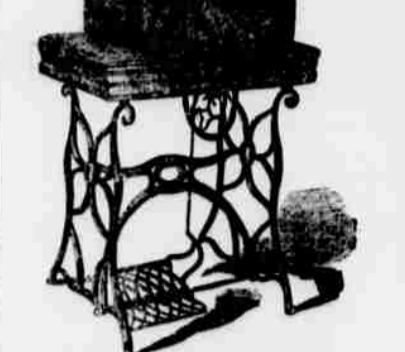
