The new oil well near Venango city, is still pumping about 30 barrels a day. Several new wells are being put down in the same locality.

Passengers are still obliged to cross the isthmus at Tryonville. The trains meet at opposite sides of the break, and passengers make the transit by plank, a distance of 300 feet.

At a May celebration near Houston, Texas, a boy of six years was bitten in the hand by a rattlesnake. A Miss Mary Boken who was present, picked the child up in her arms, and by continued sucking of the wound so extracted the virus as to save his life.

The receipts of the ticket agent of the Pacific Railroad at Omaha have averaged \$4,000 per day since the opening of the road. One day last week the evening train for Sacramento took seven passenger cars full, the majority of which were through passengers.

New Well at West Hickory. The Timesville Star of this morning says: A new well was struck a day or two since at West Hickory, and is pumping from 80 to 100 barrels per day. The well is 470 feet deep and is only down to the third rock.

The repairing of the railroad slide near Tryonville, has not progressed as rapidly as was anticipated. At the time it gave way there were three gravel cars on the track, which have entirely disappeared in the quicksand, and at last accounts they were still going down.

DEATH OF DAN W. CARPENTER.

RULES FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF REPUBLICAN PRIMARY ELECTIONS IN VENANGO COUNTY.

Adopted by the Executive Committee of Franklin, April 28th, 1869.

1st. The qualified voters of the Republican party of Venango County shall meet in the several Wards, Boroughs and Townships in said County, at such places as shall be designed by the acting Executive Committee, on the first Saturday of June next, and each year thereafter, and then and there elect, by ballot, one member of the Executive Committee of the party, to represent each of said Wards, Boroughs and Townships; and they shall in the same manner designate and select the names of such candidates for the offices to be voted for at the next ensuing general election as they may desire to be nominated for the said offices.

4th. No person shall be permitted to vote at said primary election who is not a qualified citizen, under the laws of the Commonwealth. If the right of any person to vote is objected to for the reason that he is not a member of the Republican party, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to examine matters touching the right of such person to vote, and the fact that he voted for the nominees of said party at the previous general election and publicly and fully identified himself with the Republican party shall be substantiated, in addition to his own statement, by the statement of at least one qualified citizen in good standing in the Republican party. Provided, That persons under the age of twenty-one years, but who shall arrive at the age of twenty-one years on or before the next ensuing general election, shall be entitled to vote upon having previously made public declaration of their intention to vote at the next ensuing general election for the candidates nominated by the said party holding such primary election; and provided, that citizens of the other States who will have acquired a residence in this Commonwealth on or before the next general election, shall be entitled to vote at the primary election, provided that said citizens are residing at the time in the Ward, Borough or Township in which they offer to vote.

5th. When the polls shall be closed the tickets shall be counted in the same manner as it is prescribed by law for the enumeration of the tickets voted at the general election.

6th. As soon as the votes are counted, the officers of the election shall make out a certificate, under their hands, setting forth the number of votes cast for the several persons voted for, said certificate, together with the list of voters, tally papers, and ballots shall be placed in an envelope and sealed.

7th. On the Tuesday next, after the election, the members of the Executive Committee, representing the several Wards, Boroughs and Townships, shall assemble at the Court House, in Franklin, at 11 o'clock, a. m., and proceed to add together the certificates to have been given for any person or persons in respect to any office, and after ascertaining the number of such voters shall make out and sign returns, which shall be delivered by the Chairman of said Committee to the person who shall be subsequently elected Chairman of the newly elected Executive Committee. Provided, That in case of a tie vote being given to any two or more persons for the same office, the said Committee, acting as Return Judges, shall vote by ballot, and the persons having the highest number of votes of said Committee, shall be declared nominated for said office.

8th. And at the same time the newly elected members of the Executive Committee shall assemble at Franklin, and organize by the election of a Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. They shall then open the returns delivered to the Chairman by the retiring Executive Committee, and shall cause publication of the candidates nominated for the several offices to be made in the party papers of the County.

11th. The Executive Committee shall procure a copy of the list of citizens who voted at each election district in said county at the last general election, and shall transmit the same to one of the election officers in each of said districts, as aforesaid, at least ten days previous to said Primary Election.

14th. In Townships where voting precincts have been established for holding primary elections, the member of the Executive Committee for that Township, shall appoint one Judge and two Inspectors for each precinct where he does not reside, to hold the elections and transmit the returns to him.

15th. The hours for opening and closing the polls shall be designated by the member of the Executive Committee of each Ward, Borough and township, after consultation with the members of the Vigilance Committee of said Ward, Borough or Township.
