The New Secretary of the Navy. The Hon. George M. Robeson is a son of

Judge Wm. P. Robeson, of Warren county, N. J., who was a leading Whig. long and prominently connected with the politics of the state. Mr. Robeson entered Princeton College in 1844, and upon graduating in 1846 entered the office of Chief Justice Hornblower, at Newark. Upon concluding his legal studies in 1850 be was associated for a time in the practice of his profession with the Hon. A. C. M. Remington, Subsequently removing to Camden, be was appointed Prosecutor of the Pleas; for that county in 1859. Upon the election of Ma. Frelingbuyson assenator in 1867, Mr. Robeson was appointed Attorney General of the State by Governor Ward, which position he has held until the present time. He is about ferty-one years of age, and justly holds a high rank in his profession. To his fine legal qualifications he unites a general knowledge and practical ability which give promise of efficiency and usefulness in his new position. Mr. Robeson is a strong and decided Republican, and has been earnest and active in the support of his principles On all questions of national policy be is in entire accord with the party which supported the election of General Grant. It is a curious coincidence that the only position ever held in the Cabinet by a citizen of New Jersey has been that of Secretary of the Navy. In 1823 Samuel L. Southard was appointed Secretary of the Navy by polition during the entire administration of John Quincy Adams; in 1834 Mablen Dickerson was appointed Secretary of the Navy by President Jackson, and he continued in the Cabinet of Mr. Van Buren for more than a year.

The securities were deposited in the bank by customers, and about \$20,000 worth of checks were carried off. No clue to the burglars.
