Arrest of Counterfeiters.

Those who buy and sell by retail will greatly rejoice over the recent arrest of a gang of counterfeiters in Indiana. These ingenious gentlemen had \$400,000 in twenty-five cent notes all ready to put in circulation. We regard a man who willfully forges a Treasury note for \$1,000 or \$5,000 as rather a respectable rascal in his way; but we entertain a certain degree of contempt for the two shilling rogues who conspire to cheat workmen and work-women, the poor, and those whose pecuniaries are small, though sufficient. Besides, the men who manufacture large counterfeit notes are pretty sure to be speedily detected, but a little dirty, smutty quarter of a dollar, goes measuring up and down till some honest man is able to bear the loss has the moral courage to put it into the fire. As we handle a great many of these paper substitutes for money, by the wear and tear of which there must be a great annual loss imposed upon the people, it is with small pleasure that we read of three tons of silver brought to Chicago from Colorado. A Man who has not Slept for Four Years.

A very singular case of wakefulness has just been brought to our notice. Joseph err, a cabinet maker, about 60 years of age, has not had half an hour's continuous sleep for four years. The case was thus stated to us. About four years ago, a daughter of Mr. Herr became ill and Mr. H. watched at her bedside day and night, for six weeks, when she died. All this time he took no sleep, stating that he had no desire for it. A few days after the death of his daughter he ran a nail in his foot, and this caused him to be for seven or eight weeks, not an hour of which time could he obtain sleep. After recovering from his wound he failed to obtain rest from sleep, and so the matter continued to go on, from week to month, and from month to year. His health has suffered and he complains of great debility. He applied to a leading physician in this city, who prescribed for him a strong opiate, but it had no more effect upon him, as he says, than a snuff his finger. He again applied to the same physician, requesting that the dose be increased. To this the physician objected, stating that it would be dangerous. He said he did not care, and another opiate was prepared strong enough, it is alleged, to put three or four ordinary men to sleep, and never wake up again. This had no better effect than the first, and the physician refused to administer any more doses of the kind, but advised his patient, as a last resort, to get on a high old bender. This has not yet been tried, and it may be questioned whether he can swallow enough liquor to produce intoxication and soporificousness. Mr. Herr is a sober and industrious man, but in consequence of his inability to do any kind of physical labor, it is certainly a strange case.—Lancaster Express.
