OIL WELL ON FIRE.

The Arnold & Phinney Well, on the Mallory Farm, Again on Fire—Oil Flows Above the Derrick, and the Well again in a Blaze as the Tools are withdrawn.

We noticed in THE RECORD of the 3d inst. that the Arnold & Phinney well, on the Mallory Farm, had been destroyed by fire, and last evening at about four o'clock, as the well had been thoroughly put to rights from the late disaster, and the tools were being withdrawn, another combustion occurred, which was distinctly heard for half a mile around.

Death of Secretary Rawlins. A dispatch announces the decease of Gen. Rawlins, the Secretary of War. His health had been rapidly failing for several weeks past, and on Saturday President Grant was called from Saratoga by dispatches announcing that there was no hope of his recovery.
