A Novel Rammonn .- The fatest novelty has been thoroughly demonstrated in France, is that of a single track rallway. The novel feature of the invention consists of a single rail, like a long ribbon, extending along one side of the road. One wheel placed at the forward part sione bears on the rail, while the other two rest on the ground. The cars are turnished with two wheels, placed underseath in their long axis, which rest on the rail and support their weight, while two other wheels, destined to preserve their equilibrium, are placed on the outside. The experiment with a lilipulian locomotive, drawing a series of cars carrying sixteen persons each, is thus described: The track was about lour miles long. While the train was running at a speed of ten miles an hour, it reached a grade of forty feet to the mile. which it ascended without any apparent stackening of speed. The first result was conclusive in favor of the system proposed. of overcoming the difficulties inherent to the the roud presented a series of very short enryes, of a radius of only sixty-five feet; there the train followed with marvelous smoothness and regularity. On the remrn trip the brakes were so perfectly adjusted that the velocity on the rapid descents was kept even at all times. For local purposes the system seems to be well adapted. The lucomotive used on the occasion weighed only three tona. The cost of such a line in France is estimated at about \$3,850 per
