TELEGRAPH

REPORTED FOR THE DAILY RECORD, Afternoon Dispatches.

INDIANAPOLIS, October 1. A terrible accident occurred at the State Fair this afternoon. The boiler of Sinker & Co., of this city, exploded a few minutes before four o'clock.

SECOND DISPATCH. The accident at the Fair grounds, this afternoon, is the most heart-rending that has ever occurred in this vicinity, and has cast a gloom over the entire city. The explosion occurred a few minutes before four o'clock this afternoon, when the grounds were crowded with visitors.

LATER.—The morning papers give the number of killed at twenty-seven and wounded fifty-six. The former doubtless exceeds that number as many were taken immediately to their homes, and no report has been made.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2. Mr. Lockwood, the banker, makes the following statement: I retain the trusteeship of the Lake Shore Railroad Co., but shall resign at the next meeting of the Board.

Arrangements for the Railroad Convention to be held on the 5th of October at Oswego have been perfected. The Convention will be held in Duell's Hall. A map has been constructed, sixty feet in length by eight feet in width, of the widest part of the continent from Nova Scotia to the Pacific, prominently showing all lines of railroad and canal and water navigation.

THE QUESTION whether it is a sin to sleep in meeting is being discussed in some of the journals of Connecticut.
