### Petroleum. Conflagration at Bordeaux—Burning of the Hippodrome.

The Pantin tragedy has had a short interlude by the burning of the shipping at Bordeaux, from the explosion of barrels of petroleum, on a barge. It was fortunate the rising tide and burning staves did not set fire to the whole shipping in this Liverpool of France. It is said that the authorities will be held responsible through the harbor master, for the loss of eight millions of francs, as this functionary was requested but declined to have the lighter towed into a safe place. Paris, not to be left behind, has had its circus, the "Hippodrome" burned down. Being constructed of wood, it rapidly consumed, but did not even blacken a house or scorch a tree in the vicinity. Taper horses were lost, or more strictly, portions of them, as several poor persons feasted on the charred remains of the animals.

All the gossip about the offer of an agent of the Rothschilds to place our loan abroad at a lower rate of interest has this foundation and nothing more: M. Fignot, the agent in question, arrived in this country last summer, with the intention of proposing to this government at four per cent, a loan with eight years to run, and a guarantee of a sinking fund of one quarter of one per cent per annum. He broached the subject to several well known financiers in New York and elsewhere, and from all quarters he received assurances that such a proposition would not be entertained for a moment; that the government was altogether too strong to borrow money abroad at that rate and on such time. The agent, however, did not present his proposition to either the President or the Secretary of the Treasury, and no correspondence, therefore, occurred.

Pennsylvania Trade.—The Philadelphia Ledger, of Tuesday, says: During the past week the following vessels cleared from this port with petroleum: Baris Thomas, Steamer, and ship Atlas, for Antwerp, with 583,723 gallons; brig Merrick, for Kingston, with 2,900 gallons; bark Sweppard, for Centages, with 1,000 gallons; brig Hercules, for Louisiana, with 1,431 gallons; brig Coffin, for France, with 1,000 gallons. Making a total of 626,322 gallons for the week. Three ships, thirteen barks and six brigs are now loading.

The Pottsville Daily Journal of Monday relates a sad case of a young man named Wm. Edwards, employed at the Palo Alto rolling mill, dying in the Pottsville station house, on Saturday evening, from the effects of an excessive dose of whiskey which he had taken in company with two others. The three together drank six pints, for which they paid twenty cents a pint. Edwards was picked up in the street by an officer and soon became insensible. He died within about two hours after taking the poison.

Orders have been given that the new Opera House in Paris be finished by the 15th of August, 1870. Great activity is at present visible on the work both of the interior and exterior. This structure almost rivals the New York Court House in costliness, but will be completed sooner probably than that venerable building, having been commenced as long ago as 1851. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000.

Mrs. Henry J. Weston committed suicide in Buffalo, by hanging herself with her shawl. She was laboring under a temporary fit of insanity.
