Oil News.—A new well was struck on the Chicago tract, Shamburg, on Tuesday last. It is owned by Messrs. Patterson & Dickey, of Petroleum Centre, and is doing a good 50 barrels per day of green oil.

Another well was struck on the same tract on Monday last. Owned by Taylor & Wood, of Titusville, and is yielding about 25 barrels per day.

An old well on Lease 21, Stevenson farm, owned by Patterson & Dickey of this place, and which was shut down and abandoned (the hole being plugged with clay from the bottom to the top to prevent the water from running in and flooding the surrounding wells) three years ago, was cleaned out about two weeks ago and started pumping on Tuesday last and is now yielding 25 barrels per day.

The Arnold & Phinney well No. 4, on the Maltory farm, mention of which we made a few days since as flowing at intervals before being down, has been completed and started pumping on Tuesday, yielding about forty barrels during the first twenty-four hours. The second twenty-four hours, ending yesterday, it only pumped 12 barrels.

One or two more new derricks have been put up on the McCray farm within a day or two.

There was a large crowd in attendance at the fair last evening and everything passed off very pleasantly. The music by the Columbia Corbet Band was charming; the smiles of the ladies was still more charming; the refreshments were excellent, and the good feeling evinced by all was the subject of general remark.

Now that the water pipes laid through the main street have been tested and proved in good working order, it would be a good plan for those having hydrants or fire plugs before their buildings to see that they are kept in good working order, as in case of fire they are the only thing to be depended upon.
