The most primitive post-office in the world is to be found on the southern extremity of America. It is opened by every ship which passes through the Straits, either to place letters in it or to take letters from it. This post-office, therefore, takes care of itself, is confided to the protection of seafarers, and there is no example of any breach of this trust having occurred.
