The Herald's monthly petroleum report, published this morning, estimates the average daily production for the month of December at 12,844 barrels, against 13,317 barrels per day for the month of November. The report of the daily production of some localities is overestimated largely. The daily production of the Woods farm is put down at 250 barrels per day, whereas by actual measurement it is only 163, making a difference of over 3,000 barrels less per month on one farm alone. We know of several other localities where the production is overestimated.

Two fires occurred in the vicinity of Cherrytree Run, yesterday. The Niagara Oil Co.'s tool house was partially destroyed. We did not learn the origin of the fire or the amount of damage done.

In the afternoon an engine house owned by Wm. Elliott, near Kane City, was burned to the ground. The engine and boiler were so badly damaged as to be unfit for use again. This fire was occasioned by the upsetting of a derrick lamp.

About seven o'clock this morning a fire broke out in the boarding house in Wild Cat Hollow, occupied by Mr. Greenwell, and for a short time it was thought the building would be destroyed, but through the exertions of those present it was extinguished. This fire originated from a defective flue. We have repeatedly cautioned our citizens to examine their chimneys and flues and see to it that they were put in order. By the time a half dozen more fires occur, probably the warning will be heeded.

We understand that a man named Kennedy was quite severely burned at the time the engine house was destroyed, near Kane City, yesterday. He was in the engine house at the time, and in endeavoring to put out the flames was injured as above.

The Oil Creek Ministerial Association meets at the Methodist Church in this place this evening at 7 o'clock. The meeting tonight is open to the public, and a cordial invitation is extended to the citizens to be present.

Our townsman, Mr. S. A. Woods, returned home Saturday evening, after a brief visit to New York and elsewhere. Mr. W. is looking well, and reports business a little dull outside and money hard to get.

The Poisoned Pork.

A DETAILED AND CONNECTED ACCOUNT OF THE TRICHINA CAUSALTY—FOUR PERSONS ALREADY DEAD—FACTS AND INCIDENTS.

Belvidere, Ill., Jan. 1.—I am enabled to send you this morning a detailed and accurate account of the terrible cases of trichinae spiralis now existing in the town of Hampshire, Kane County, about eighteen miles southeast of this city. Various statements have been published in relation thereto, nearly all of which contain error.

The farm on which these cases originated is owned by M. S. Molony, Esq., who resides, the greater part of the time, in New York City. Mr. G. W. Downs, of this place has charge of various pieces of property belonging to Molony, among them this Kane county farm. Mr. Downs has been absent for a week at this frightful suffering, engaged in attending to the wants of the afflicted people as far as possible, and returned last evening. From him I learn what follows:

The family living on Molony's farm as also the families on several of those adjoining, are Germans. Last fall the former turned in a sow to fat, the animal being one and a half years old, and which had dropped a litter of pigs in the summer. She was killed about three weeks ago, and was in fair condition, neither poor nor fat, and apparently healthy. A part of the animal was cut into hams, and a portion made into Bologna sausages.

The family began eating the meat, and gave some to the neighbors, all using it without cooking. In three or four days several members of the family were taken sick. Dr. Mesick, of Marengo, was called, but after a few days, as he was at a loss to determine the character of the disease, Dr. Green, of the same town, was employed, who immediately pronounced it trichinosis. In two weeks ten persons had been seized with the malady. Four have died, five cannot possibly live, and one has but the faintest show of recovery.

After the death of a young woman, Dr. Green dissected a piece of flesh from her thigh, and also obtained a piece of meat identical with that eaten, and took the parts to Elgin, where they were placed under a magnifying glass with an enlarged power of six hundred times, and subjected to a searching examination. The parasites were discovered in innumerable quantities. It is estimated that they existed to the number of a million (?) to the cubic inch. As seen under a glass they appear to be an inch long and with fat head.

The patient suffers fearful agony. They have their senses, and describe the sensation they experience to be like the acutest rheumatic pains. When moved in the slightest manner their sufferings are intense. Their eyes are glassy and protruding, and mouths parched.

Several physicians from Elgin, Marengo, and Sycamore, have visited the dying victims. The attending physician, Dr. Green, an experienced and able practitioner, says there is no ascertained method of treating trichinosis, and that whatever is done must be of a nature wholly experimental. He has little hope of succoring these under his care, but may be able to arrive at results which will benefit future sufferers.

The trichinosis are taken into the stomach with the food in a dormant condition. In about three days thereafter, being vitalized, they are found to have made their way into the muscles of the patient's body. There they commence the work of destruction, and continue it until the muscles are consumed. They breed and die every three days, and multiply by thousands. The only time when the patient is free from pain is during the hours when this change is taking place. The duration of the sufferer's life is to be measured only by his capacity for endurance, being usually from three days to a week.

During the past two or three months some rasal or rascal has plugged the Cherrytree Run Pipe to Rynd Farm no less than three times. By reference to the advertisement in another column it will seem that the Company offer a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the parties in this nefarious work. It is to be sincerely hoped that they will be arrested and made to suffer the full penalty of the law.

Mr. C. Persons, owner of the Person's farm, upon which property the new oil town of "Red Hot" is located, disclaims being the author of that name, and says its rightful name is Personville. It will be a hard matter to change the name at this late day, as that of "Red Hot" has come into general use among oil men.

COURT PROCEEDINGS.

FRANKLIN, Jan. 7, 1870.

Court met this morning in pursuance to adjournment. The court charged the jury in the case of Edmonds vs. Cumberland Valley Mutual Protection Company. After a short absence the jury returned with verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$1,742 65.

D. F. Walcott vs. Borough of Pithole City, Keenan for plaintiff and Sherman for Defendant. Amount of verdict agreed upon for plaintiff \$300.

Borough of Pithole City vs. Geo. Massey and James Rooker. Sherman for plaintiff, Rheem for defendants. Verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$372.

Central Oil Co. vs. R. M. Whipple and E. G. Rannels. Myers & Kinneair for the plaintiff, Spencer & Sherman for defendant. Verdict for plaintiff in the sum of \$661 06.

Cotton in large quantities is arriving in New Orleans, and the Times of that city says the levee presents very much the aspect of the olden time. Up to the time of the report, six hundred thousand bales had been received, and it is stated that if the negroes had worked as industriously as they should have done, the crop would have been five hundred thousand bales larger. The amount shipped to all ports exceeds that of last year by two hundred thousand bales, and the general estimate is that the total receipts of the year will exceed last by 500,000 or 600,000 bales. The largest cargo leaving the port this season was cleared on Thursday of last week at the Custom House in the American ship Loretto Fisk, for Liverpool. The amount was 5,518 bales, weighing 2,456,534 pounds, value \$597,554.
