Gold to-day 121 3/4.

The first monthly report of the Petroleum Producers' Association appeared this morning. The number of districts reported is 51; No. of barrels of oil on hand at the wells at the close of the month, 108,775; No. of barrels of oil delivered from wells during the month, 304,412; Aggregate, 415,739; Deduct No. of barrels of oil on hand at the close of last month, 75,145; Balance showing the production for the month, 344,743; Aggregate per day for the month containing 31 days, 11,120; No. of wells producing during the month, 1,783; Average daily production of wells during the month, 6 bbls.; No. of wells being drilled, 377; No. of wells completed during month, 93; No. of wells commenced during the month, 136; No. of wells abandoned during month, 56; No. of abandoned wells resumed during the month, 21. The report is very interesting.

At a meeting of the Directors of the Columbia Oil Company, held at their office in Pittsburgh, on Wednesday, Jan. 12th, the secretary, treasurer and superintendent's report were read and submitted to the stockholders' meeting the following day. The reports show a daily production of 327 barrels, making the total amount of oil produced for the company in the past year of 119,355 barrels, and the average price per barrel for oil sold being \$5.48, making the total amount for sales \$654,955.40. At the stockholders' meeting of the old Board of Directors were reinstated with one exception. Mr. J. B. Weir, of New York, withdrew, and Mr. Alexander Pitts, of Pittsburgh, was elected in his place.

We are pained to announce the death of Miss Lorena Patterson, sister of Mr. Jas. Patterson, of the firm of Patterson & Dickey, which occurred at the residence of Mr. Dickey last evening. Miss P. came to this town on a visit to her relatives the first day of January, and shortly after was taken sick with typhoid fever, and rapidly grew worse until death relieved her from her sufferings. She was aged 18 years, and was a very estimable young lady. Funeral services were held at the residence of Mr. D. this forenoon. The remains will be taken to her late residence in Mercer county for burial.

The track of the A. & G. W. R. R., was flooded with water to the depth of two feet, for a long distance between Oil City and Meadville. Occasioned by French Creek overflowing its banks. The flood occurred this forenoon. Trains both ways were delayed.

Meeting of the Producers' Association.

The regular monthly meeting of the Managers of the Petroleum Producers' Association was held at Oil City on the 12th inst. The meeting was called to order by the President; the Secretary, C. V. Culver, being absent. F. W. Hastings was elected Secretary pro tem. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. Reports of committees, and a statement of the progress making with monthly report of oil production for December were made.

The action of the National Refiners' Convention held at New York last month was next discussed. At that convention it was charged that the producers of this region adulterated their oil at the wells by mixing with it tar and benzine, and that the gravity of the oil was thereby lighter and the oil of less value to refiners. A standard, of gravity by which to purchase oil, was adopted by the New York convention another same action was taken at a subsequent meeting of the Pittsburgh refiners held in that city. After a general discussion of the proceedings of the refiners' convention a committee consisting of J. T. Brigs, of Titusville, John Porter of Cow Run and W. L. Lay, to inquire as to the truth of the charge of adulteration and as to the practicability and expediency of selling oil by a standard gravity and to report thereon. The meeting then adjourned.

An extensive scheme for smuggling goods by way of ports on the coast of Maine has been discovered and broken up, arrangements had been made for fishing schooners to meet ships at sea, out of sight of land, and take packages of valuable goods which have to be sent by rail to Boston and New York.

During the month of November forty-two vessels loaded with 38,000 tons of guano at the Guanape Islands.

Attempts are being made by the Peruvian Government to promote colonization on the Amazon and its affluents. Steamers are now running up to Iquitos eighteen hundred miles from Para.

A young man residing in Washington was severely whipped, a few days since, by two fair Philadelphians there, who charged him with having made remarks derogatory to their character. Their victim loudly proclaimed his innocence, but in vain. His injuries confined him to his room for several days, and some of his friends say there is to be another act in the drama.

An urechin of seven years went into a barber shop in Racine, Wisconsin, and ordered the barber to cut his hair as close as shears could do it. He was asked if his mother ordered it that way. "No," said he, "but school commences next week, and we've got a school ma'am that pulls hair."

A little boy of Provincetown, Mass., four years old, very anxious for a drum, the evening preceding Christmas Eve, on going to bed made the following prayer: "Now I lay me down to sleep, I want a drum, I pray the Lord, I want a drum, my soul to keep, and if I should die before I wake, I want a drum." His prayer was answered.

The breweries of San Francisco manufacture 135,000 barrels of beer, including ale and porter, annually; employ a force of 200 men, and consume 15,500,000 pounds of barley and 200,000 pounds of hops in the production of the above amount of malt liquors. The barley is raised in California.

The trial of Dr. H. K. Stratford, charged with the murder by abortion, of Theodora Patterson, alias Kellogg, was commenced in the Circuit Court at Chicago on Tuesday. The trial is the first one under a law which declares that a person who produces an abortion resulting in death shall be deemed guilty of murder. The case excites deep interest.

Rudolphe, the Frenchman, is the next contestant for the billiard championship. He will play with Deery, probably in San Francisco, and on the fifteenth of February.

Rev. James Dolan, pastor of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church, Baltimore, for the past twenty-nine years, died on Wednesday.

NEWS ITEMS.

The French R-d Republicans in New York are going to demonstrate in a few days over the murder of Victor Noir. There is another strike among the workmen in the Erie railroad shops.

An interesting argument was commenced in the New York Supreme Court, general term, involving some highly interesting principles of international law, and also as a matter of fact, showing how, during the war, the Confederate soldiers were furnished with uniforms and other army goods.

The Louisiana Senate Thursday passed the bill to amend the Constitution removing political disabilities.

Thomas Bradshaw, an aged man, living near Sharpsburg, Ky. a few days since struck his wife on the back of the head with an axe. Believing her to be dead he hung himself.

John Martio, formerly of the steamer Savannah, but latter baker on the steamer Mary Davage, while in a state of intoxication fell asleep on the railroad track at Cairo Wednesday night, and he was instantly killed by the cars. He leaves a wife and child in Davenport, Iowa.

Tom Allen has received the articles of agreement for a fight with Jem Mace, and accepts them, with the exception of the one requiring him to go to New York within one week of the fight, to select a referee. This he and his friends consider unjust.

General J. M. St. John, formerly Engineer in Chief of the rebel government, has been elected City Engineer of Louisville.

The United States war steamer Severn, with the monitors Dictator and Saugus, arrived at Havana from Key West Thursday.

Ernest Pohl, a German magistrate was arrested in Nashville Thursday at the suit of his wife, whom he left in Indiana some seven years ago. She brings suit for divorce and alimony. Pohl has another wife, a woman of some property, whom he married shortly after settling in Nashville.

At a meeting in St. Louis Thursday night, to consider the subject of the removal of the national capital, committees were appointed to correspond with the Governors of the several States and members of Legislatures, in the interest of the project.

The Fifteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States was ratified by the Senate of Minnesota Wednesday by a party vote—thirteen to sixteen.

A special from Ottawa, Canada, says the Minister of Marine has advertised for six swift sailing schooners, to be used as marine police on the coast. It is not probable, in view of the continued opposition to reciprocity by the American Government, that more stringent legislation will be adopted next session for the protection of the Canadian fisheries, and some modification be made in the tariff on the same grounds.

Alfred P. Hill, who owns considerable real estate in Cincinnati pleaded guilty to two indictments for permitting a house to be used as a house of ill fame, and was sentenced to two hundred dollars fine and thirty days in jail.

A fire at Nos. 105, 107 and 109 Madison street, Chicago, Thursday night, caused a loss of \$40,000; insured for \$20,000.

The Directors of the Norfolk and Great Western railroad have agreed to close a contract with New York parties to build the entire road to Bristol, Tennessee.

Horatio Seymour has been re-elected President of the American Dairymen's Association.

THE WHALE FISHERIES.—The New Bedford (Mass.) journals state that the stock of oil and bone in first hands in this country, on January 1st, 1870, was 25,022 barrels sperm oil, 41,813 barrels whale oil, and 291,900 pounds whalebone. On January 1st, 1869, the stock was 13,000 barrels sperm oil, 15,700 barrels whale oil, and 200,000 pounds bone.
