A SCENE OF DEATHAND DESTITUTION. - A St. Louis police officer sent the following to his chief on Sunday last: "I have the bonor to report that between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning Sergeant Sheridan met a little girl of the most miserable and povertys ricken appearance on Second street, near Cherry. She was crying bitterly. Upon being questioned by the Sergeant, she stated that her mother was dead and her father was drunk. The Sergeant went with her to a place in the rear of No. 1.004 North Second street, where he beheld a most horrible sight. On a board, covered with an old blanket, lay the lifeless body of the child's mother. Beside the corpse were two bottles of whisky and two glasses, the buband and father sitting close by in a state of dranker idlicey. There was not a particle of turniture in the room but the stool upon which the drunkard was sitting. As the officer entered be was invited by the icebriate to take a drink. The scene, however, was too selemn for the Sergeant to smile." The room without a particle of furniture-the dead mother under a dirty blanket-the whisky bottles and the drunk, en lather -- the half naked, poverty-pinched child, its poor little heart breaking with woe at the midnight hour-formed a picture of misery, degradation and death not soon to be forgottes. The woman's name was Bridget Dunn. The little girl is thirteen years of age."

Nitro-glycerine is a combination of glycrine (the sweet principle of animal fat) and nitric and sulphuric acids. The process of manufacture is very simple. Take, for instance, one pound of glycerine and ten pounds of the scids, and place them in a proper vessel. The sulphuric acid operating on the rest of the mass extracts all sequeous matter, while the nitro sinks to the bottom of the vessel and joins with the glycerine, whose density carries it there at once. The result is an oleaginous substance, not unlike castor oil in color, but rather more talck, which, on being washed and thoroughly cleonsed of such particles sulphur c sold as may have remained, is uttre-gigeerine.
