The Petroleum Trade.—The Philadelphia Ledger says: During the past week the following vessels cleared from that port with petroleum: Brig Dale, for Barbadoes, with 5,500 gallons; barque Peddler, for Genoa, with 112,941 do.; barque Medora, for Cork, with 117,099 do.; making a total of 235,441 gallons for the week, and 1,688,884 gallons since the 1st of January.
