W. Rv. They are to be succeeded by the Union Express Co., headquarters at Pittsburgh. We are not advised as to whether the change will cause the removal of any of the route agents or expressmen on the line, but hope not. Mr. Morgan, the agent at this point, has been connected with the office for a long time, and his manner of transacting business has given universal satisfaction. We trust no change will be made.

PETROLEUM IN CANADA.

LARGE INCREASE IN THE YIELD DURING THE YEAR.

The product of the petroleum springs in Canada has largely increased within the past year, and has affected prices to a remarkable degree. The oil district is situated in the country of Lambton, the extreme portion of the Province of Ontario, and is separated from Michigan by the St. Croix river. It is reached by a branch railroad running from Wyoming, on the London and Sarnia branch of the Great Western Railway of Canada. On the discovery of petroleum springs in this region several years ago, the rage for speculation was as intense as that which prevailed in Pennsylvania on the same subject. During the excitement villages sprang up on every side, land was sold for fabulous prices, oil companies were organized in large numbers, and wealth was acquired in a marvellously short time. The excitement then extended over the whole province, and in every direction were to be seen crowds of enthusiastic oil seekers boring for petroleum springs. In the midst of the trouble the Fenian invasion came, and with it a great crash, which ruined large numbers of speculators. The villages became deserted and operations ceased. Within the last year or two the business has revived, and the villages of Petrolia, Oil Springs, and Botwell are again flourishing. Petrolia, though in former times suffering from the rivalry of the other villages, has now, it is asserted, become the great center of the oil producing region, being surrounded by over three hundred wells. Some of these springs are overflowing, and indicate a copious supply. The crude oil at this point sells for \$1.40 to \$1.50, in gold, per barrel, and the refined oil at 23 cents per gallon. It is calculated that the crude petroleum yields from 60 to 80 per cent. of pure oil. Redneries have been established at various cities on the shores of Lake Ontario, the principal of which are situated at Hampton and Dundas.

The Island of Juan Fernandez has been purchased by an enterprising German, who has exported thither a considerable colony of his countrymen, and supplied them with suitable implements of agriculture. The popular notion of the island, derived from Robinson Crusoe, is a very incorrect one. Juan Fernandez is a long, rocky island, about as large as Staten Island, lying 400 miles off Valparaiso, but on the coast of Chili. It things have not deteriorated since Saluti's time, the German Colonists will have plenty of quarters, a climate so good that the trees and grass are verdant all the year round, and a soil so fertile that everything thrives luxuriantly.

The people near Freeport, B. W. Va., and Christian Hook, Long Island, are working themselves into a fever on the Mormon question. A meeting lately held at the East Meadow was broken up, the Gentiles entering the room in force and ordering the Latter-Day Saints to make tracks, and threatened them, unless they desisted from attempting to convert their wives and daughters. The citizens of Freeport say they have talked enough, and now propose to act, so it is expected that exciting times are in store for the good people of that section.

The impression prevails quite generally that the steamer City of Boston, now thirty one days out for Liverpool, has been crushed by icebergs. Her agents think she has been forced to make for the Azores, and may yet be safe.

Rumors were circulated in Jersey City on Wednesday that some notable changes were taking place, or were about to take place, among the Erie railway officers. Upon inquiry it was ascertained that intimations have been given from the headquarters of the company, in Twenty-third street, showing that the resignation of General Rucker is being considered, and leading to the belief, also, that other sweeping changes are to be made.
